Income Tax

WHO? Single persons who had net income of \$1,000 or more for the year 1920; married couples who had net income of \$2,000.

When? March 15, 1921, is the final date for filing returns and making first payments.

Where? Collector of Internal Revenue for district in which the person resides.

How? Full direction on Form 1040A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.

What? Four per cent normal tax on taxable income up to \$4,000 in excess of exemption. Eight per cent normal tax on balance of taxable income. Surtax from 1 per cent to 65 per cent on net income \$5,000.
