Modern Crank Case Service.

"The average motorist," said J. E. Balseley, District Sales Manager of the Standard Oil Company, "knows he should have his crank case cleaned ever so often, but he doesn't know exactly why. It's not the most pleasant job, and he lets it go, usually as long as he can. After all, the reasons for keeping an automobile crankcase clean are simple, and mighty convincing.

Oil Becomes Dirty.

"Lubricating systems of automobiles are almost universally of the circulating type. The amount of oil pumped always exceeds the actual amount required for lubrication by the bearing surfaces. The surplus flows back to the main reservoir to be again circulated by the pump. As the oil circulates, and as it rests in the crankcase, it becomes contaminated by fuel that works past the piston, by carbon that forms on and falls from the under side of the piston heads, by road dust that is sucked in through the breather pipe, by water, a product of combustion, which may work past the pistons and mix with the oil and metallic particles which are the result of the wear and tear of operation. With the first movement of the engine the process of oil contamination begins and it increases as operation continues until the oil becomes charged with dirt and loses its lubrication value.

Change Oil at Frequent Intervals.

"To keep the engine running at its best, change the oil in the crank case as often as the manufacturer's instruction book says it ought to be changed. However, it is not sufficient to simply drain out the old oil, for that leaves deposits of dirt and badly contaminated oil in the crankcase to impair immediately the efficiency of the new supply of oil when it is poured into the crankcase. The whole operation must be most thorough.

Modern Crankcase Cleaning Service.

"Cleaning the crankcase is a troublesome job to the average motorist. For this reason regular cleaning of the crankcase was often neglected.

Head of Family Gets an Exemption of \$2000 From Income Tax.

Two Hundred Dollar Exemption Allowed for Dependents Under 18, or Incapable of self-support. March 15 Last Filing Date.

Net Incomes of \$1,000 or Over if Single and \$2,000 or over if Married Must Be Reported.

Single persons, though required to file a return if their net income for 1920 was \$1,000 or more or if they are the heads of families granted a special exemption under the revenue laws. Such a person is defined by Treasury regulations as "a person who actually supports and maintains in one household one or more individuals who are closely connected with him by blood relationship, relationship by marriage or by adoption, and whose right to exercise family control and provide for these dependent individuals is based upon some moral or legal obligation".

Such persons are allowed the exemption of \$2,000 granted a married person. In addition, they are allowed a credit of \$200 for each dependent under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective.

HUSBAND AND WIFE

A married person living with husband and wife can not claim an additional \$2,000 exemption as the head of a family. His or her exemption is based upon the marital status, irrespective of the same household. The additional \$200 credit for dependents does not apply to the husband or wife of a taxpayer. For example, if a married man supports a father who is incapable of self-support, he is entitled to the \$2,000 exemption allowed a married person, but not to a \$200 credit for a dependent.

A son who has left home but who sends his mother more than one half the sum required for her support is entitled to the \$200 credit, provided the mother can not support herself. Otherwise, the amount must be considered as a gift, and therefore, the credit is not allowed. A son living at home and supporting his father, mother or other relative may claim the \$2,000 exemption allowed the head of a family, but not the \$200 credit unless such relative is under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support.
