## HALSEY NEWS NOTES

ALSO ITEMS OF INTEREST FROM EVERYWHERE

### Mrs Quick Called Home.

Mrs M. J. Penland-Quick was born May 4th, 1840, in Illinois. She was 80 years of age. She was a prominent pioneer of the Willamette valley and she died at her home in Halsey at 7:25 p. m, Feb. 3, 1921.

Mrs. Quick's residence in Oregon began in 1847, when she crossed the plains with a train headed by Thomas Cox, her grandfather. Captain Cox established the first store at Salem where he and his large family of married sons and daughters with their small children settled. They took donation claims around Salem. Captain Cook brought goods across the plains by ox teams and established the first store in our capital city. Mrs Quick remembered that weary journey of six months and also the members of the immigrant train. One of her playmates on the way was a little boy of seven, just her own age, who afterwards became U. S. District Judge. This was C. B. Billings. Others who became prominent in the state might also be mentioned.

Mrsrtha Jane Brown was married to Henry Penland in 1854 and went as a bride to live on his donation claim at Philomath. Some of this claim is now a part of that town. Here her eldest sons, Elias E. Penland now of Halsey, and L. E. Penland of Pendleton, were born. Mr Penland was a pioneer from Ky., arriving in Oregon in 1852. Five years later Mr Penland sold his donation claim and moved with his family to the old home place in this community where he spent a useful life as one of the leading farmers of this county.

In this final and permanent home were born four daughters, two of them dying at a very early age. One of the other daughters, Fannie, now Mrs P. T. Starr of Portage, Montana, survives her she and her husband, Dr. Starr, were with her the last few months of her life. Her other daughter, Mera, married H. C. Davis of Halsey, and after a long illness died twelve years ago, a loss that she never ceased to feel.

Mrs. Quick lived to see grow to useful manhood and womanhood twelve grandchildren. She is survived by two sisters, Miss N. Spenser of Halsey, and Mrs D L Matheny of Los Angeles, California.

She was a member of the Methodist church for 60 years and a leader of the W. C. T. U. for many years.
