A Wreck at Alford Station.

A broken rail caused two coaches of the Southern Pacific north-bound passenger train No 18 to jump the track into a ditch last Sunday about noon near Alford station. Fortunately no one was seriously injured.

A wrecking crew was immediately sent out from Albany to the scene of the wreck and by 6 o'clock the track was cleared for traffic.

Train No 18 resumed its trip about 2 o'clock in the afternoon, after a southbound passenger train had transferred two of its coaches to the other. There were comparatively few passengers on board.

C. R. Evans for County Agricultural Agent.
