DREW LAUGHTER FROM GRANT

Witty Remarks of Mark Twain Broke Down Reserve Characteristic of the Famous Soldier.

Responding to the toast of "Babies" at the memorable Chicago banquet in honor of Gen. Grant in 1879, Mark Twain concluded with a sentence that set the gathering in an uproar. In his inimitable drawing voice he said:

"In his cradle, somewhere under the flag, the future illustrious commander-in-chief of the American armies is so little burdened with his approaching grandeurs and responsibilities as to be giving his whole strategic mind, at this moment, to trying to find some way to get his own big toe into his mouth, an achievement which (meaning no disrespect) the illustrious guest of this evening also turned his attention to some fifty-six years ago. And if the child is but the father of the man, there are mighty few who will doubt that he succeeded."

At that conclusion the audience broke into cheers and roars of laughter in which even the reserved Grant joined.
