Fishing through the year with hook and line is permitted in the Rogue river, and the game bill creates a commission of five members to be appointed by the governor. #### Woman Juror Bill Fails.

Oregon women will not be forced against their wills to serve on juries for the house defeated the woman juror bill introduced by Mrs. Kinney, Astoria representative.

The Roosevelt military highway bill. fathered by Senators Norblad and Hall, passed the senate with only four negative votes, but the bill was vigorously denounced by R. A. Booth, chairman of the state highway commission in an argument before the house committee on roads and highways and the opposition of the state highway commission caused a revulsion of sentiment and it is very doubtful if the measure is passed by the house.

The Roosevelt Highway was originally approved by the people and calls for \$2,500:000 of state money to be matched by a like amount of federal money for a coast military and scenic highway. This contingency was stricken out in the senate bill and in its present shape it calls for setting aside of \$2,500,000 for the road, to be paid for by direct taxation.

Road Committees Make Progress. The joint road committees have made progress in whipping proposed legislation into shape and the bills will receive attention this week.

The committees put the stamp of ernor Olcott that the highway commission be given the power of eminent domain and authorized to purchase or acquire parks and scenic beauty spots along the highways, and to improve and maintain them out of the state highway fund.

#### Teachers' Bill Defeated.

Meat Packers Divided On Bills.

Independent small packers and stockmen were arrayed against repreentatives of the stockyards and the big packers in the committee on agri culture and forestry over the Upton bills. These measures are calculated to work certain reforms in the hand ling of cattle in the stockyards to the benefit of the growers and are strong ly opposed by the big packers.

Indications point to a favorable re port by the committee on the bill which requires statements of meat in cold storage, but the bill calling for carcasses to be stamped as to grade price will not receive the favor

The Ellis bill providing for the marking of boundaries of unfenced lands was killed in the senate.

The bill providing for punishment of habitual criminals passed the house Members of the state legislature inspected the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis Saturday.

The house killed Representative Hubbard's bill prohibiting the use of seines, fish wheels, traps and other gear on the Columbia river.

The senate approved Senator Nickelson's bill providing that notaries shall not charge for the administering of an oath of verification of any claim against the state.

A house bill by Representative Wells providing a penalty for any person' who shall willfully misrepresent his personal assets when seeking credit, was approved by the senate.

The senate upheld the adverse re port of the judiciary committee and refused to refer to the voters of Oregon the question of repealing the 6 per cent limitation amendment to the constitution.

Under a bill introduced by Senator Banks and approved by the senate, persons wishing to annul a marriage contract must have been residents of the state for a period of one year prior to the commencement of the suit.

A senate bill by Eberhard, providing for the employment of a full-time Protestant chaplain and a part-time Catholic chaplain to officiate at the several state institutions near Salem, was indefinitely postponed by the senate.

Among the important measures which awaited final action when the ession adjourned Saturday were the oad bills, reapportionment bill and the appropriation bills. A total of 745 bills had been introduced in both houses.' Of this number 366 were introduced in the house and 379 in the senate.

According to the records the governor had signed 55 measures originating in the senate and 74 house bills.

### Few Big Measures Passed.

Among the measures of general interest passed may be mentioned:

The new state fish commission and new state game commission and the fish and game. codes.

Of more than local importance was the decision of the legislature to abolish forever the purse seines and the trollers, who have been operating for years along the Oregon coast.

Another general bill of general interest is the one which provides for double election boards; one board to count the votes while the other board s receiving the ballots. There are restrictions which will prevent any information as to how the count is going until a few minutes after the polls close. The principal advantage of this law will be that the result of elections. will be known almost immediately after the voting ceases.

#### Anti-Alien Land Law Killed.

The anti-Japanese legislation way killed in the senate. The senate, after the most spirited debate that has marked the present session of the legislature, by a vote of 20 to 9 defeated the bill. This bill had strong support in the house, but the belief that the Japanese question is something for the federal government to handle rather than the state prevailed in the senate. The bill was practically a duplicate of the California bill on the same sub-

ject enacted last year. The bill received 34 affirmative votes in the house, three more than required as a constitutional majority. Opposed to passage of the bill were 25 representatives, with one member of the house absent

## Appropriatione Will Exceed \$6,000,000.

At the completion of its labors the joint ways and means committee and nounced that it had reached an agreement to recommend to the legislature appropriations for state departments and institutions for the biennium of 1921-1922 approximating \$6,667,338.97. This amount is \$142,603.02 above the amount of money available under the 6 per cent tax limitation of the constitution, but it is believed sources to meet the excess amount will appear.

The excess of \$142,603.02 Fepresents special appropriations, measures approved by the committee not included in the budget and also requests presented in person to the committee at its hearings by the representatives of the various departments or institutions.

## Marriage Test Bill Passes.

The people are to have the opportunity to say by their ballots at the next general election whether or not examinations shall be required of all applicants for marriage licenses as to health and mental fitness of such applicants to enter into the marriage contract. The house passed senate bill 174 with only eight negative votes.

The act provides that it shall be uplawful for any official of Oregon to issue a marriage license to any person until after the applicants shall have submitted to and passed an examination by a regularly licensed physician, competent to examine such applicants, as to their health, in regard to contagious or communicable venereal diseases, and mentality, as shown by the physician's certificate.

Provision is made in the bill for it being referred to the voters of the state at the next general election.

#### Bills Passed Over Veto.

The senate, by almost unanimous vote, passed house bills 38 and 66 over the veto of Governor Olcott. These bills were passed during the special session of the legislature in January, 1920, but were later rejected by the executive for the reason that they were not considered emergency legis lation.

One of the bills gave to the highway commission power to fix the salary of the state highway engineer, while the other measure provided for an increase in the emergency fund of the state highway commission from \$50,-000 to \$70,000.

Passage by the house of a bill previously passed by the senate repealing the gasoline test law, wipes off the statute books a measure enacted in 1907, enforcement of which contributed largely to a gasoline famine in the state last year. Companies refused to bring supplies into the state until the law, which required gasoline to be of fifty-six gravity test, was sus pended by Governor Olcott. Legislative Brevities.

Would Deport Allen Public Charges. The board of control, under a bill introduced by Senator Vinton, is authorized to use state funds for the deportation of non-resident aliens and so-called public charges confined in the public institutions of this state. For the purpose of facilitating the return of such persons, the board of control may enter into a reciprocal agreement with any other state or states for the mutual exchange of such public charges. Under the bill a person shall be deemed to be a restdent of Oregon who shall have lived in the state continuously for a period of two years.

Soldiers' Bonus Referred to Voters The senate by a vote of 28 to-2 ap proved house joint resolution No. 12 referring to the voters of Oregon at the next general or state election the question of amending the constitution so that the state may lend its credit in an amount not exceeding 3 per cent based on the assessable property valuation to provide funds with which to pay participants in the recent world war a cash bonus of \$15 a month for the time they actually served or a loan not to exceed \$4000.

By the same vote the senate also approved house bill 203, which provides for the creation of what will be known as the world war veterans' state aid fund and prescribes the manner in which the bonuses shall be paid and the loans executed.

Senator Lachmund introduced . bill providing for an increase in the salary of the governor from \$5000 to \$7509 annually.

A resolution providing for an increase in the pay of members of the state legislature to \$5 a day, and not in excess of \$300 for one session, was laid on the table by the house.

The legislature has adopted a joint resolution calling for the display of the American flag on school houses, churches and other public places on Mothers' Day.

The legislature enacted a bill making it a misdemeanor to fall to support an indigent parent and providing . fine to be used for such support.

After considerable discussion the house approved a bill giving women of the state of Oregon the right to serve on juries, subject to the approval of the bill by the voters at the next special or general election.

All motion pietures shown in the state must be approved by a state board of three motion picture censors under the terms of a substitute censorship bill introduced by the house committee on health and public mornis and passed by the house.

A bill introduced by the committee on agriculture and forestry, providing for the organization of co-operative associations, passed the senate by vote of 26 to 4.
