### Halsey vs Albany

Albany Moose defeated Halsey, 21 to 17, in the third game of the basketball series for the season, played on the floor of the Community House gymnasium Thursday evening. The contest was hard fought, though remarkable for the number of shots that were not productive of scores. This was especially true of the work of the Albany quint in the first half. Shot after shot fell short of the goal, but several of the throws were made after the players had been tearing down the line at top speed and the interference of the Halsey team prevented good aim at the basket.

The score was a tie—8 to 8—at the end of the first half. In this session Allhands, for the Moose, made two field baskets, and Cox and Kropp one each. For the Halsey quint, Goodbrod landed two balls safely inside the hoop, and Cross got one. Goodbrod converted two fouls.

McKern replaced Kirk at center for Halsey in the second half and Clark was substituted for Alford as one of the guards. Both teams played fast and furiously for the advantage, with the odds in favor of the Moose quint almost from the start. Hall, Cox and Allhands each garnered two field baskets, and Allhands converted one foul for the Albany team. For

the Halsey quint, Cross made three field baskets and Goodbrod one. Goodbrod also converted one foul.

Halsey made one basket and the Moose one throughout the game.
