Strawberries and Grape Vines.

In setting strawberries, great care should be taken to not set the crowns too deep, so that the heavy spring rains may not force dirt into the crowns and smother them out, according to C I Lewis of the Oregon Growers Co-operative Association.

Varieties to plant for canning are the Trebla, Wilson, and probably the Ettersburg 121. For shipping, the best varieties of strawberries are the Gold Dollar, New Oregon and the Marshall. For home use, the Progressive, a berry which with a little irrigation will bear at least two heavy crops a year.

Grape vines should be given very good care when set. If a grape is allowed to become stunted in its early life, it never amounts to a great deal. It is a heavy feeder and should be strongly fertilized.

The vine should be thinned especially the first few years. Cut back your canes to about two buds at time of setting.
