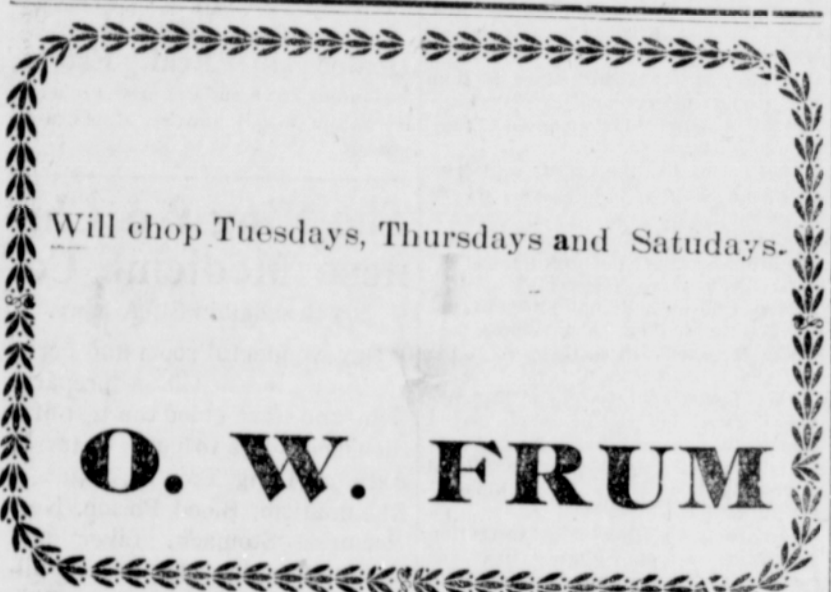

Last Friday evening the Charity Grange community was organized for farm bureau work with twelve members present. C P Kizer was elected president and Mrs B M Miller secretary-treasurer. A dairy herd improvement project, subdivided into a cow testing association, eradication of tuberculosis, and marketing will be led by Mrs J H Darrah. A wool and mohair marketing project will be headed by C P Kizer. The poultry improvement project will include culling projects and the marketing of eggs, led by Mrs Darrah and Mrs Ed Kizer. The farm bureau membership project will be led by Mr and Mrs Miller.

Shedd

Wednesday evening of last week County Agent Heyman held a community meeting and organized an auxiliary farm bureau with W W Poland pres and C H Davidson sec protem. The morning was devoted to a discussion of the community program, and in the afternoon the program as outlined was adopted. The projects undertaken and leaders named as follows,

Dairy cattle improvement, eradication of tuberculosis, bull organization, and co-operative marketing; Leaders were, C C Dixon, J C Clay, C W Malson, and E G Pugh.

Soil improvement; W W Poland and C H Davidson leader; drainage, fertilization and soil analysis.

Boys and girls' club work; Mrs E W Shedd, leader with Mrs W P Moore, Assistant; pig, poultry, and calf clubs projected. Stanley Van Winkle is in charge of fair exhibits from these clubs. J C Clay and C H Davidson are in charge of the beef calf clubs, and W H McConnell of the Jersey calf clubs.

Certified seed; R G Hamilton leader. The plan is to grow certified wheat, corn, oats, and potatoes.

Rodent control; John Pugh, leader, J H McConnell, assistant. A plan similar to the Lake Creek project was adopted.

Culling demonstrations; Clarence Brown, leader. The goal is 3 poultry demonstrations a year.

Shedd was treated to another bull scare last night, or at least those down at the depot were. W H McConnell had sold one of his young bulls to a man in Coos County and had him all crated up and ready to ship, but the bull objected just as he was being loaded into the car, and broke the front

end out of the crate and climbed out and down. Everybody scattered, including the editor. Another attempt to ship the animal will be made tonight.

Among other things done at the Farmers Bureau this afternoon was the appointment of John Pugh chairman of the Committee for the extermination of rodents. Beginning April first there will be a contest to see who can get the most scalps, of moles, gophers, rats and squirrels.

A bounty of 2 1-2c will be paid on rats, 5c on squirrels, and 10c on gopher and moles. The Contest closes in time for the Community Fair in the Fall; anyone under sixteen years of age can enter. But it must be understood that there must be no buying and selling of scalps and anyone found doing so will be counted out. The scalp of the rats, squirrels and gophers must include the ears and the scalps of the moles will consist of the nose.
