their papers to the college. The committee on awards will announce the winners soon after the close of the contest.

The first contest will be conducted in the various high schools of Oregon in the next two weeks. Any high school student who has been graduated within the last year may also enter the contest provided he or she has never attended college.

"The small town student has an equal chance with the large town student in this competition," says one member of the committee. Printed rules governing the contest are being sent to every four year high school in Oregon by the committee on awards and honors at the college.

Boys and Girls from All Over the State to Picnic at Shedd

A statewide picnic for boys and girls of Oregon engaged in club work will be held June 11 on the farm of J C Brown and sons, of Shedd. The Linn County Jersey Cattle club is backing this picnic and has arranged to serve luncheon at noon.

Prizes amounting to \$50 will be offered by the Albany chamber of commerce for winners in contests in placing Jersey cattle. Three divisions will be judged: one each of aged cows in milk, young cows in milk, and heifers. Four animals of the same division will constitute a class. Contestants will indicate on a slip of paper the order of value to be placed on the four animals. Fifteen minutes will be allowed for placing each class. Two contests have been announced. Teams of three men from any Jersey Calf club in the state are eligible for contest number one. All members must belong to the same club. Each team must send its entry to Fred N Williamson, county club leader, at Albany, by May 15, and each one is expected to report on the Brown farm by noon on the day of the picnic, according to the rules. Thirty-five dollars will be apportioned out in prizes to the high-scoring teams, in amounts of \$12, \$9, \$7, \$4, and \$3 in order.

Contest two may be entered by any member of a boys' or girls' club project, except those who entered contest one. This is an individual contest and seven prizes are offered: \$1, \$3, \$2.50, \$2, \$1.50, \$1, and \$1. The same rules will govern this contest as used in contest one.

The Brown farm is one mile from Fayetteville, on the Oregon Electric. H C Seymour, state club leader and L J Allen, state livestock club leader, will attend the picnic. Professor E B Fitts, of the department of dairy husbandry, will be official judge of awards.—Democrat.
