Will The Farmers of Halsey Have A Farm Bureau Local?

Information has come to us that the farmers in the vicinity of Halsey, many of whom are members of the Farm Bureau, have shown little inclination to organize a farm bureau local, such as are now doing effective work at Harrisburg, Charity, Lake Creek, Brownsville and Shedd, besides eleven other communities in the county. This it seems is a reflection on the character of Halsey farmers and we would like to remind them that the best way to get the worth of their farm bureau membership is to make the farm bureau work for them.

All of these communities mentioned above circle about Halsey. All of them have started an active campaign for the eradication of tuberculosis among cattle, in conformity with the Farm Bureau program "that the southern half of the county clean up on all tuberculosis this year." And yet with all this activity about us the Halsey farmers have made no effort to get into the game to do their part.

We have also been informed that county agent Heyman has arranged to set aside Saturday the 28th of May for a meeting date with the Halsey farmers and cooperate with them in perfecting a farm bureau local if the farmers of this vicinity show any desire to organize.

We would like to urge farmers of Halsey to take advantage of this opportunity. If an organization here would accomplish nothing more than the eradication of tuberculosis among cattle, the effort

would repay the farmers a thousand times.

Remember the date, Saturday night 8:00 p.m. May 28th in the Council Chamber of the City Hall every farmer whether he is a member of the Farm Bureau or not, should be out let us show that Halsey is still on the map and it as progressive any other center.

Amanda Ellen Dawson was born in Indiana, January 12, 1849, and spent the early years of her life in that state. On December 24, 1869 Miss Dawson was united in marriage to Jacob Miller. In 1878 Mr and Mrs Miller came to Oregon, locating on a donation land claim near Shedd. With the exception of a few years spent at Oregon City, Mrs Miller has resided on the farm almost ever since coming to the state. While in Indiana she became a member of the Christian church. She was also a member of the Pioneers association and the Indian War Veteran association.

Besides her aged husband, Mrs Miller is survived by three sons and one daughter. The sons are E G Miller of Portland, and John and Lester Miller of Shedd. The daughter is Mrs Stella Painter of Shedd. She is also survived by a brother, Hail Dawson of Halsey, and three sisters, Mrs Connie Dorn of Ashland, Mrs Gault of Weed, Calif, and Mrs Wren Sax of Ohio.
