Highway Builders

The outfit of the highway workers on the highway near the O. F. Neal farm south of town was visited by miscreants on Tuesday night and much oil and gasoline as well as considerable damage being done to the tanks. One barrel of gasoline was emptied and the connections of the gasoline tank on one of the engines were damaged in an effort to remove the tank and secure the gas it contained, and in order to lighten this tank so it could be handled much of this gas was drained, considerable of it being allowed to run on the ground. The faucet of a tank of engine oil was also opened and the oil allowed to run out on the ground, presumably after taking all the oil they wanted. Whether this is the action of a gang of professional thieves that may be working in the neighborhood or of some one passing through is conjecture, but in either case it is to be hoped the thieves may be apprehended and the proper treatment doled out to them.

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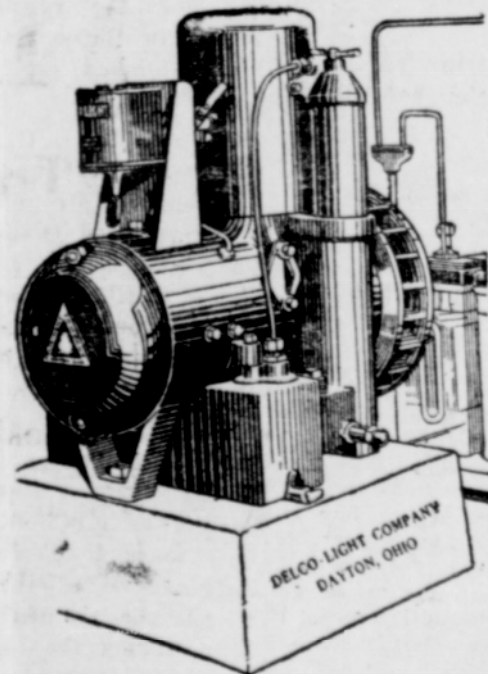
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
