Carl David was in from Holley the forepart of the week, bringing a big load of oats for O. W. Frum.

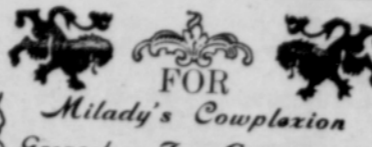
