The young granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Roberts, who makes her home with them, is seriously ill.

Under the auspices of the Ladies' Study club an auction sale was held on Main street, in front of the old livery barn, Saturday afternoon. Auctioneer Lawson doing the selling. There was a large quantity of pies, cakes, homemade bread, fruits (canned and green), jellies, jams, chickens (live and dressed), a turkey and vegetables sold. Since everything was donated, the proceeds were practically net, and amounted to about \$80. The sale was for the benefit of the public library.

Dr. Geary was widely known throughout this western country as a public spirited citizen, and was at one time tendered a high political office in state affairs, which office of governor of the territory of Oregon he declined because he had dedicated his life and splendid abilities to the preaching of the gospel and would not be urged aside from that purpose.

The Bible study class organized by Rev. A. M. McClain for high school pupils who desire to take the course prescribed by the state superintendent of instruction, and hereby secure certain credits in their school work, in addition to the greater benefit obtained from the study, is growing and promising to be a success. One student, Miss Isabelle McKercher, comes from Crawfordville to take the work.

Miss Lillie Warmoth, owing to the serious illness of her aunt, Miss Anna Warmoth, has given up her school work temporarily and her grades in the South Side school are being taught by Miss Schildmeyer, who lives just north of town.

The high school football team played the Junction City team Friday on the local gridiron, the game resulting in a score of 13 to 0 in favor of the Brownsville boys.

The celebration of the 25th anniversary of the dedication of the Presbyterian house of worship on Tuesday was a flattering success. Beginning with the big dinner at noon, the attendance was large and every minute of the time from then until 10 o'clock at night was filled full of good talks, stories and incidents of the long ago. Many came from long distances and felt fully repaid. R. R. Templeton, the oldest living member, was present. Rev. J. E. Snyder, pastor when the church was dedicated, Revs. Harry Templeton, James Thompson and George Pratt, former members, now in the ministry, all had prominent parts in the program. It was a day not soon to be forgotten by the members of the church and congregation both old and new.

Little "Billy" Dedman was taken suddenly and seriously ill Monday evening and for a time his life was despaired of and a child specialist from Portland, called by telephone, arrived early Tuesday morning and with Dr. Waltz rendered medical aid. By afternoon the little patient was reported greatly improved, with prospects of recovery.
