

**FORGE STAMPS IN ARGENTINA**

Large Circulation of Counterfeit Five-Cent Issue Discovered in That Country.

Buenos Aires.—A swindle of large proportions has been perpetrated on the Argentine post office department by the printing and sale of false 5-cent stamps. The sale of these stamps has been going on possibly for years, but it was only recently discovered. The department has ordered the withdrawal of the issue.

The post office department admitted that the fraudulent stamps were practically identical with the authorized ones and that it was not possible to trace the source of the questionable supply.

**Girls' Basketball Rules**

There has been some criticism regarding the refereeing and umpiring of the girls' games. A few statements will suffice. The girls' game is far different from the boys'. The national committee sent out this year a request that the rules for girls be strictly enforced, for the game was tending to become too rough, and each official was asked in the rule book to enforce the laws governing each game very closely.

The Halsey girls have been trained that way, while anyone knowing the game can in a moment realize that other teams have been permitted to foul in their training and even defy an official.

If two girls of opposite teams stand side by side and one puts her hand or arm in front of the other, this constitutes a foul.

Tripping is a foul. Taking hold of the hand, arm, shoulder or body is holding, and makes a foul. When a player has the ball and is in the act of passing it an opponent rushing up and throwing arm forward either above or around the player with ball, or coming in contact with the body of the other, is also a foul. The one doing the guarding must stand in a straight or vertical plane, keeping both hands square with the body, and cannot put arms around body of opponent, cannot hold a hand or both hands over ball or touch a ball in the hands of another player; this is over-guarding and is a foul.

Showing or pushing an opponent is a foul. Hitting or hacking at an opponent is a foul.

Dribbling the ball more than once before it is passed to another player or thrown for a basket is a foul.

Two players jumping for ball, if either or if both take the one hand from the back before the ball is tapped, this is a foul.

If two players on one side and one on the other scuffle for the ball, unless one of the players of the two on same side pulls back instantly, counts two on one and is a foul against the side where the two players are involved.
