George Tetzie Dead

George Tetzie of Brownsville died in a hospital at Eugene Saturday evening from a hemorrhage of the brain resulting from injuries received at a boxing match at the armory there Friday evening.

He fought a match with Carl Miller and was getting the worst of it when in the seventh round he was felled and was unable to resume. He started from the fall but fell and was picked up unconscious and taken to the hospital.

His wife and father responded to a call by phone and were at his bedside, but he never regained consciousness.

Tetzie was a scioned boxer and had helped entertain his comrades in numerous bouts at Camp Lewis, where he took training for the war.

The remains were taken home to Brownsville and the funeral was Tuesday. His widow is expected soon to become a mother.

He was in partnership with his father, Theodore Tetzie, in the meat business, having charge of the slaughter house and the outside work. His wife, father and mother and small sister Eleanor were among the many mourners. He was about 31 years old.
