### IN TAKING FARM INVENTORY

Miscellaneous Collection of All Kinds of Supplies Should be Listed Together.

On every farm at inventory time there will be found a miscellaneous collection of all kinds of supplies, such as purchased feeds, seed, fertilizer, twine, nails and lumber. These, together with the amount of manure on hand, are all listed under the heading "Supplies," according to inventory methods worked out by the United States Department of Agriculture. Fells, bolts, screws and the like can not be listed as one item, regardless of varying sizes and kinds, giving the approximate number of pounds. Where a definite system of carrying such shop supplies is in use, as is the case on some of the well-organized, large farms, the quantities of the different items of this nature are easily counted or weighed and appraised accurately.

This kind of property, like machinery and tools, has been bought by the farmer and should therefore be appraised at cost, plus any expense incurred in getting it to the farm. For example, if a ton of bran is bought for \$64, \$1.25 spent for freight on it, and 75 cents' worth of man and horse labor needed to haul it from the station to the farm, the appraisal should be made at the rate of \$46 a ton.

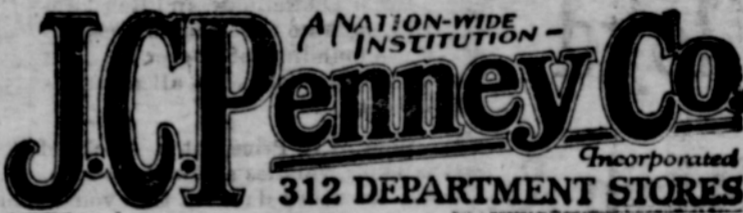

### Decent Folks Don't Want Him

The issue in the Arbuckle case seems to have been whether the young woman whose death Arbuckle was accused of causing died as a result of physical violence committed by him or from the effects of a liquor debauch in which he furnished the liquor.

As an experiment, the producers will release an Arbuckle film. It had properly been assumed that the public would not care to witness the photographed antics of an actor, no matter how comical his obesity, so long as he was under accusation of making a fatal attack upon a young woman. But it is now assumed that the public may not be so particular concerning a comedian who has been tried and acquitted, but against whom there remains the undisputed charge of indulgence in low orgies, contempt of decent conventions and defiance of prohibition law. The suggestion of a return of

Fatty Arbuckle to the screen is inopportune and insolent.

Roscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle is reported to have been deeply affected by the verdict at his third trial, which resulted in his acquittal.

Leaving out of the discussion the question of whether or not he committed the crime of manslaughter, there can be no doubt that he violated the laws of decency in a most flagrant manner. If the public re-accepts him as a popular idol, if it pays good money to see his productions and thus re-establishes him financially, it will mean that he has been acquitted in the court of public opinion. That would be a plain miscarriage of justice, and we do not think it will occur.

A film featuring Fatty was advertised at Bellingham, Wash., but a storm of protest from decent people caused it to be withdrawn.
