Free Summer Vacation

Young men who love outdoor life are invited to become the guests of Uncle Sam from July 27 to August 25, 1922, at either of the citizens' military training camps which will be conducted at Camp Lewis and Fort Worden.

The government will provide transportation to and from camp, board, lodging, medical attention, uniforms, equipment, arms, ammunition, laundry, athletics, recreation and religious service privileges in the various creeds. Applications for the red course, which requires no previous military experience, are especially desired.

Successful applicants for these summer outing privileges will incur no obligation for future military service, the purpose of these camps being to stimulate and promote citizenship, patriotism and americanism, besides returning these young men to their homes physically benefited through expert physical direction and athletic coaching.

Age limit 17 to 27 years; experience men to 35 years.

Almost any average healthy young man can meet the physical requirements for admission to these camps. Applications must be in on or about May 31. For necessary information folders write Chief of Staff, 96th Division, Portland, Oregon, Room 323 new post office building.

Wearable second-hand coats and suits for men, women and children, overcoats, shoes, cotton and wool stockings, blankets and quilts and everything else that will give warmth in winter and service in summer are wanted for the near east relief. The things not wanted include lace, silks, very thin cotton and all other articles neither warm nor serviceable. Anything is wanted that might be needed in America if no clothing, cloth, needles, thread or buttons had been available for six years.

"And do leave the buttons on" is the request. Last year a whole shipment of clothing came to one relief station minus all the buttons—not even hooks and eyes to hold the garments together in the fierce wintry winds.

Deliver bundles early at the local station or send directly to Near East relief, Portland. Clothing must reach Portland not before May 24th, nor later than May 30th.

Where does the Bible teach two Hells?

Rev. 20: 14: Hades was cast into the lake of fire.

By what names does the Greek New Testament distinguish between these two Hells?

(1) Hades, Rev. 20: 14: Hades was cast into the lake of fire. (2) Gehenna, Matt. 10: 28: Fear Him who is able to destroy both soul and body in Gehenna (Gehenna).

What Name does the Hebrew Old Testament give to both Hells?

Sheol, Ps. 138: 16: For Thou wilt not leave My soul in Sheol. Job 7: 9: He that goeth down to Sheol shall come up no more.

Who go to the first Hell?

(1) The evil, Ps. 95: 10: Let them go down quick into Sheol; for wickedness is in their dwelling. (2) The good, like Jacob, Joseph, Job, Hannah, etc. Gen. 37: 35: I will go down to Sheol to my son mourning. Job 14: 13: Oh, that Thou wouldst hide me in Sheol! Is. 38: 18: I shall go into the gates of Sheol.

What puns people into the first Hell?

(1) He, 1 Cor. 15: 55, 56: O death, where is thy sting? O Hades, where is thy victory? The sting of death is sin. (2) Death, Ps. 138: 5: The voice of Sheol was round about me: the voice of death came upon me. (3) Pain, Ps. 138: 5: The voice of Sheol

compassed me; and the pain of Sheol got hold upon me. (4) Trouble, Ps. 88: 3: For my soul is full of troubles; my life draweth sigh unto Sheol.

When do people enter and leave the first Hell?

(1) Enter, 1 Kings 2: 9: Thou shalt bring his head down to Sheol with blood. Prov. 7: 27: Her house is the way to Sheol, going down to the chambers of death. (2) Leave, Acts 2: 31: He foreseeing this spoke of the resurrection of the Christ, that He was not left in Hades.

Is there any life in the first Hell?

1 Sam. 2: 6: Jehovah killeth, and nether alive; He bringeth down to Sheol, and brought up. Ps. 89: 48: What man is he that shall live and not see death, that shall deliver his soul from the power of Sheol? Prov. 5: 7: Her feet go down to death; her steps take hold on Sheol.

Are those who are in the first Hell conscious?

Ps. 8: 5: For in death, there is no remembrance of Thee; in Sheol who shall give Thee thanks? Eccles. 9: 10: There is no work, nor device, nor knowledge, nor wisdom, in Sheol, whither thou goest.

What other Scriptures teach the unconsciousness of all in the first Hell?

Job 14: 12: He will come to honor, and he knoweth it not; and they are brought low, but he perceiveth it not. Ps. 146: 4: His breath hath perished; he returneth to his earth: in that very day his thoughts perish. Eccles. 9: 5: The living know that they shall die, but the dead know not anything. As well their love as their hatred and their envy is perished. Is. 63: 16: There are our Father, though Abraham knoweth us not.

What Scriptural figure corroborates this thought?

Gen. 38: 1: And many of them that sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake. John 5: 28, 29: Our Lord Lemuria has fallen asleep; but I go that I may awake it out of sleep. Some speak of his death. Acts 7: 60-6: He fell asleep. And Saul was consoling into his death. 1 Cor. 15: 17, 18: And if Christ hath not been raised, . . . they also that are fallen asleep in Christ have perished.

With what is the first Hell associated?

Job 26: 6: Sheol is naked before the Lord, and Destruction hath no covering. Prov. 27: 20: Sheol and Destruction are never satisfied.

What does the first Hell temporarily do to those who enter it?

Job 24: 18: Drought and heat consume the steam waters; so both Sheol and those who have sinned.

What things beside human souls go to the first Hell before the judgment day?

Is. 54: 17: Thy pomp is brought down to Sheol, Ezek. 31: 17: All the trees of Eden, the choice and best of Lebanon, . . . also went down into Sheol with him. Ezek. 31: 27: They shall not be with the mighty . . . that are gone down to Sheol with their weapons of war. Matt. 23: 33: And thou, Capernaum, . . . shalt go down into Sheol.

Will the first Hell be destroyed by the awakening of the dead?

Ezek. 31: 14: I will remove them from the power of Sheol, O Sheol, I will be thy destruction! 1 Cor. 15: 54, 55: That shall come to pass the saying that is written, Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is thy sting? O Hades, where is thy victory? Rev. 20: 14, 15: Hades gave up the dead, Hades was cast into the lake of fire.

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
