### HE DEFINED DREAD MALADY

French Physician Who "Discovered" Diphtheria Is to Be Honored by the Medical World.

The medical world is preparing to commemorate soon the centenary of Bretonneau's discovery of diphtheria.

The dread malady is not really so modern, of course, as the anniversary suggests. It was known to the ancients as the "Egyptian evil," and appeared in frequent epidemics both in the British isles and on the Continent during the Seventeenth and Eighteenth centuries. But it was Pierre Bretonneau of Tours who first identified the symptoms in a collective diagnosis and defied the disease in the celebrated treatise laid in 1821-22 before the French Academy of Medicine. The famous Tours doctor also gave the disease the name, of Greek derivation, by which it is now known in medical textbooks throughout the world.

The Bretonneau centenary will be celebrated at Tours under distinguished medical auspices.
