HAS MERELY SHOW OF FORCE
Prince in Java Lives Magnificently, but the Dutch "Resident" is Real Ruler.

Sultan Hamengkoe Boewono VIII has only recently ascended the throne of Djokjakarta, Java. His father has retired, at the ripe old age of eighty-three, to a palace in the outskirts of the royal city, with many wives and concubines and eighty-six children to gladden his declining years. The young sultan, chosen by the Dutch government to succeed him, is not yet officially married and has only 22 children. He dwells within the "kraton," or palace inclosure. Its walls are twelve feet high and more than four miles in circumference. Within them is a city of fifteen thousand souls—members of the royal household, carpenters, gardeners, goldsmiths, batik-makers. There is a palace for the sultan and one for his chief wife and one for the Dutch Resident to occupy when he comes on a visit. There are barracks for the sultan's army and stables for his elephants, and outside the gate is a royal zoo. Truly a magnificent array! But though the sultan is one of the four so-called independent princes of Java, he must share his throne with his Dutch "father," as he calls the Resident.—The Asia Magazine.

PERIL IN SCRUBBERS

Dr. Andrew Wylie of the London Throat and Ear hospital calls attention in the Lancet to a new domestic danger. He has had several cases lately in which pieces of wire were found in the throat and larynx, owing to cooks cleaning kitchen utensils with a steel scrubber. The scrubber consists of steel shavings rolled into a ball. In course of time pieces of steel get detached and, being very small and almost colorless, escape the cook's notice and are served with the food.
