REDS AT THE HELM

Strikers Confess Murderous Train Wrecking

Men arrested in connection with the wrecking of a train on the

Michigan Central railroad, when the engineer and fireman were killed, confess that the wreck was planned at a meeting of strikers and four men were selected to do the work, and they did it. Their object was to kill the engineer and fireman, they say, and they did not care who else suffered.

All four who confessed were formerly employed in the New York Central shops. An agreement was made with the striking shopmen from the Michigan Central to "trade wrecks." Michigan Central strikers, in return for the wreck of the special, or any train that came along, were to wreck a New York Central train, or destroy the great shops at Elkhart, but the place was too closely guarded and after the Michigan Central wreck such a hue and cry was raised that the other conspirators feared to wreck a New York Central train.

"We wanted to kill the fireman and engineer. The others would not run the trains if we killed a few engineers and a few firemen," concludes the confession.
