JENNY LIND'S "PARLOR CAR"

"Swedish Nightingale's" Railway Coach Possibly Suggested the Modern Comforts of Travel.

When Jenny Lind, known in her day as the "Swedish Nightingale," was brought to this country by P. T. Barnum, she spent much of her time in traveling from city to city; and, to reduce the uncomfortableness of touring to a minimum, she had the seats of an ordinary car removed and the vehicle furnished with chairs, tables and other pieces of furniture appropriate to a parlor. She called it her "parlor car," and from that term sprang the designation still applied to coaches de luxe on the rail.

The action was taken up and other parlor cars were built, but divided into a series of attractively furnished rooms, because in those days even the richest man hardly cared to hire a whole car. Private cars were yet unthought of.

At about the same period the first dining cars made their appearance. They were most primitive affairs, a long counter running "fore and aft," at which passengers stood while they

The first sleeping cars arrived in the early fifties. They had berths along the sides three deep, like bunks in a lodging house. The bottom man lay on the floor, the middle man not far above him, and the top man with his nose too near the roof for pleasantness to his olfactories. There was no ventilation; the light | was furnished by smoky kerosene lamps, and in winter a wood stove gave heat .- Baltimore Sun.
