Wants Thistle Law Changed

J. A. Stevenson, leader of the war on the Canada Thistle in this district is a disappointed man, and is convinced that there must be a change in the law before the pest can be stopped from spreading all over the country. There are acres of thistles within a few miles of Halsey, and they are distressing-ly thrifty.

Mr. Stevenson began the campaign with much enthusiasm. He signed up nearly every farmer in his district for the war.

The law requires the occupier of the land, whether renter or owner, to prevent any Canada Thistle on it from maturing seed. Those who fail to do so are to be given ten days' notice, after which the pest may be cut and the cost made a lien on the land. All lovely? By the time it becomes manifest that a man is not intending to obey the law and cut his thistles they have become so far advanced that within the ten days of the notice, to which are probably added a couple of Sundays, they will have blossomed and some of the seed will have ripened. After the ten days the authorities may cut the thistles, but besides those already ripe, those blossoms about ready to open will lie where cut and mature seed. Mr. Stevenson's remedy for this flaw in the law would be to eliminate the ten days' notice. If the farmer did not cut them immediately, in this case, the official might do it in time to prevent the seeding.

Mr. Stevenson hired a man, on his own responsibility, to cut one patch, but the stout, wood-like stocks broke the machine and the job was abandoned.

The Enterprise will here remark that there is no human probability that Oregon will ever again be free from the Canada Thistle, as it was a few years ago. When it was first discovered in this state the stitch in time was not taken, and nine thousand stitches, or nine million, will not repair the damage. But by all striving, all the time, to keep it down the thistle may be prevented from destroying all the arable land of the country.
