THAT WORD "TREMENDOUS"

The idea of fear and trembling underlies the formation of the word "tremendous." The English word tremble is a close kin, by way of the French language, to the Low Latin word "tremulo."

The Latin word "tremendus" literally meant something that ought to cause trembling, that is to say, fear, either because of the size of the object so designated or because of size added to other fearful qualities.

At first applied to physical objects alone, the word was gradually extended to immaterial things, such as issues, movements, passions or other attributes of the workings of nature or of man. But the origin of the word is the primitive sense of fear at mere size.—Milwaukee Sentinel.
