OREGON VERY WET

Railroad Traffic Interrupted Lives and Property Lost

It rained, and it rained, and it rained. Roads were flooded in every direction. Deep water cut us off from automobile connection with Brownsville or Albany Saturday and Sunday and a washout on the railroad between here and Albany stopped the mails Saturday. Rev. C. T. Cook made his regular trip to Harrisburg Sunday, but when he came back he would not have liked to try the trip again. And Halsey sat safe and sane above the flood.

Washed out or unsafe bridges, the result of the heavy rain of the week end, have cut off through railroad trains from Portland.

A good deal of damage was done by water in the basement of business houses in Albany.

Water reached the thirty-foot mark in Albany, the seventh time since 1861.

The Santiam and Sandy rivers cost seven human lives, much stock and some buildings.

Harrisburg had good boating in the streets part of Sunday.

The Southern Pacific forces were on their job. They had trains running through Halsey by 5 o'clock Monday morning.

A locomotive on the Coos Bay line ran into the Siuslaw river near Mapleton.

A Southern Pacific culvert near Divide washed out, stopping traffic.

The Pacific highway was flooded on both sides of Eugene.

Much of the business section of Lebanon was reported under water Sunday morning.

Water covered some of the streets in Eugene.

Soils were partly under water.

Halseyites went as far as Shedd Sunday to see what a real flood looks like. What they saw looked like the ocean excepting the absence of rolling waves.

The Breitenbush bridge, near Detroit, went out.

The Willamette fell four feet in 24 hours at Albany Monday and Tuesday.

Brownsville was cut off from Halsey by high water Saturday afternoon and Sunday but the flood soon subsided.

Trains on the Coos Bay line are still unable to pass the scene of the wreck near Mapleton.

The county court estimates the damage by the storm to roads and bridges in Linn, outside of the Pacific highway, at \$10,000.

Mrs. Mildred McMahan, state president of the Rebekahs, went down from Halsey and installed the Albany Rebekah officers Friday night.

Frank Pickens of Sweet Home has been arrested for deserting the young wife he married 18 months ago when she is about to become a mother and unable to work and support herself.

Mary E. Darling of Brownsville has been granted a divorce and the custody of her three children, Beatrice, 18, Marie, 14 and Frank, 13.

Police court records show that the number of arrests for drunkenness, vagrancy, assault, immoral acts, disorderly conduct and fighting and of injured persons assisted, presumably the result of the use of liquors and the presence of saloons, were 10,392, 10,514 and 10,228 respectively in the last three years before prohibition. Since then, while the population has increased by 50,000, this class of cases has run from 2709 to 8,642 per year.
