Stockholders and employees of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company have benefited since the eight-hour day was inaugurated by the company, five years ago, according to a letter from its president, S. F. Welborn, made public by the federal council of churches.

The letter said:

"The trend of production per man hour, with unimportant exceptions, has been upward since the adoption of the eight-hour day, and in every department of our steel manufacturing operations, from blast furnace to the wire mill, our production per man hour is now greater than it was when

the eight-hour day was inaugurated."

It Pays To Grade Eggs.

A Willamette valley farmer gives a striking illustration of the results of grading, in a letter to the state market agent.

He has about 200 hens. He shipped two cases to a commission house in Portland, filling the cases as the eggs came from the nests. He received 21 cents per dozen, \$12.60.

The following week he packed the small dirty and misshapen eggs together in one end of a crate and labeled the rest of the eggs "white henneries." Result, 45 dozen of graded eggs he received 24 cents per dozen for, and 21 cents per dozen for the 15 dozen culls—a total of \$13.95 as against \$12.60 the week before at same price.

A scourge of caterpillars, reported to have hatched in the upper Yaquina valley, delayed the Yaquina train an hour Wednesday night of last week. They covered the track and the trainmen were compelled after exhausting their supply of sand to sweep the track with brooms. They reached Corvallis and covered the sidewalks and the Eugene Register says that afforded a fine chance for early birds. They didn't eat grass, like Nebuchadnezzar, but destroyed about everything else green. Then came a little fly and laid eggs in their heads which hatched into fatal parasites and many caterpillars are defunct. Great fleas have little fleas to bite 'em, and little fleas have lesser fleas; so on, ad infinitum.

What Farmers Need Added to Credit And Good Advice

If the farmer is not prosperous there can be no permanent prosperity in other industries, because the farmer's purchasing power, under normal conditions, is one of the most potent influences we have in the United States. When conditions with the farmer are good, and he is receiving the cost of production plus some thing more for his labor, he is in a position to buy from the manufacturer.

A condition that affects the farmer, cutting off his purchasing power, destroying his belief in himself, in the banker and in everybody else, can only bring about a chaotic condition, which affects every business man and laboring man in the United States, regardless of what job he may have.

The farmer had all the credit and

advice he needed during the period of prosperity, but he, with us all, suffered depression. There clearly must have been something lacking to enable him to go on in the even tenor of his way. The answer is very plain. It is that some means need to be provided to enable the farmer, after his labor has been expended, when the crops have been harvested, or when his live stock have reached the stage where he must ship it, to liquidate his indebtedness. He must have somebody interested in him sufficiently, not altogether from his own standpoint, but from the standpoint of the banker and business man, so that he can put his products on the market at the time when they will bring him the most.

I do not mean to endorse every imaginable scheme for co-operative marketing, but I do believe the basic idea is worthy of consideration from the banker's standpoint as well as the farmer's standpoint. Bankers are certainly interested in the farmer, by reason of the fact that they cannot be prosperous in their own business unless the farmer also is prosperous. They must interest themselves in the farmer, not only in giving him the business advice he needs and in financing him during the period of construction, but also in helping him place his products on the market at a time when they will bring him the cost of production, plus a reasonable addition for his services and in payment for his labor expended.

CIGARETTES

We find the following essay by Martha Kumlir, which won the W. C. T. U. prize at Brownsville in the Times:

Our body is the temple of God and he expects us to keep all poisonous and harmful germs out of it. Some boys haven't enough sense to keep poison like cigarettes out of their body. Cigarette smoking is the cause of many people going to the asylum and dying. When boys first start to smoke it makes them sick. This shows that it is poisonous. Second, it stunts the growth and will stop them from growing strong. It will also dull the mind and bring disease to the body. Know a boy who has dulled his mind and voice by smoking cigarettes. He was a very smart boy before he began. Now he has no ambition to go to school and can't keep his mind on his studies. He has quit school. He had a good voice but now he can't sing well because he is short of breath.

Cigarettes are made of tobacco, which contain nicotine, and the paper covering is also poisonous.

A boy smokes because he sees men smoke and thinks it's big and smart, and then he gets the habit. When he forms the habit, it leads to other bad habits. A boy that smokes cigarettes can't get a good job.

A large amount of money is spent each year for tobacco while it might be spent for a more useful purpose. The use of tobacco is a filthy as well as an expensive habit.
