Held up at Boundary

Experiments conducted by the Forest Products Laboratory of the U. S. indicate that sawdust of coniferous wood can be converted into a wholesome cattle feed. A preliminary feeding trial, using a product prepared from eastern white pine, was conducted in cooperation with the Wisconsin college of agriculture. With the sawdust feed representing about 25 per cent of the ration, the cows maintained their production of milk and showed an appreciable increase in butter fat production. A decided increase in weight was noted during the period in which they were fed the treated sawdust. The sawdust is made palatable and digestible by chemical treatment. It is believed Oregon fir sawdust will be superior to that from pine.
