Halsey pumps a perfectly wholesome water supply, so that on the score of health we have nothing to complain of, but there are minerals in it that combine imperfectly with soap and clog the pipes from time to time. It is "hard" water and not the best for laundry or household cleaning uses. The new line, if built, will bring to our doors the purest and best in unlimited quantity, and it probably would not be flowing past us long before we should tap it.

Light and power are on the program of the projectors. They hint that they may be able to sell electric current at such a price that it may be economically used in place of some of the fuel we now buy, as well as reducing the light bills, for water power is the least expensive known.
