Roseburg is to have a strawberry carnival this year on May 22, 23 and 24.

Buildings now under construction at Bend represent a total value of \$80,000.

A new hotel is planned for the town of Marcola, Lane county. It will have 30 rooms.

A company of the Oregon national guard will be organized in Astoria this spring.

Salem's annual blossom festival schedule originally for April 20 was held Sunday.

At a special election at Newport the commission-manager charter was defeated by two votes.

There are now nine women prisoners in the federal ward of the Oregon state penitentiary.

Recent rains and stormy weather have retarded farming operations considerably in Willamette county.

The annual district convention of the Yamhill county Rebekahs was held at Dayton with a representative attendance of about 200.

A branch of the national organization known as the Lutheran Brotherhood was organized at Silverton with a charter membership of 50.

The city of North Bend has a large improvement program on hand for this summer and more than 30 blocks of paving will be laid before fall.

Herman Larsen, a rancher of western Lane county, has received from the county a bounty of \$47.50 on 19 seals killed in the Pacific ocean.

James A. Barker was killed instantly when the eight-horse team he was driving to a plow on the ranch of O. H. Reeder of Athena ran away.

The North Bend school board has let the general contract for the building of the new school house to Hoover & McNeill of Albany for \$32,000.

Five men were injured at the main mill of the Coos Bay Lumber company at Marshfield when an 18-foot flywheel on the engine went to pieces.

Miss Celia Gavin, city attorney for The Dalles, has filed her declaration with the secretary of state for the office of presidential elector on the democratic ticket.

Fire losses aggregating \$84,100 resulted from the 28 fires in Oregon outside of Portland during March, according to estimates advanced by Will Moore, state insurance commissioner.

The slump in the lumber market and the consequent reduction of approximately \$3 per thousand feet in the price of logs are having their effect on the logging industry of the lower Columbia river.

Approximately \$1000 has been donated to The Dalles volunteer fire department toward the purchase of a new combined chemical and hose truck. The money was raised by voluntary subscription.

As a result of the establishment of a salmon egg receiving station on the Clatskanie river, orders have been issued to close that stream to fishing between the station and a point two miles down stream.

M. H. Brown has established a milk goat farm on his ranch on the McKenzie river 10 miles east of Eugene. He will have 78 milk goats and will erect a cheese factory and also make a specialty of goat milk for infants.

Six million feet of fir timber on Indian creek near Reed postoffice has just been sold by the forest department to Henry L. Bergman, banker and lumberman of Florence. The price paid by Mr. Bergman is \$2 a thousand feet.

Mrs. Gertrude B. Brown, a widow and employed in a Klamath Falls box factory has filed her declaration as candidate for the office of sheriff of Klamath county on the republican ticket and she will oppose five men seeking the office.

An embargo against entry of California vegetables into Oregon was ordered by the Oregon state livestock sanitary board, to continue until the foot and mouth epidemic now prevalent in various parts of California is entirely cleared up.

Emigrant movables shall not be shipped from California into Oregon unless accompanied by a federal or state certificate certifying that the same have been properly cleaned and disinfected, according to a proclamation issued by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian. The proclamation was in connection with the fight being made against the hoof and mouth disease which is raging in California.

There were three fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ending April 10, according to a report by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were Roy McGill Beach, Devitt, fireman; James Jonsrud, Sandy, rigging man; and Louis Larson, Knappton, foreman. A total of 516 accidents were reported during the week.

Six thousand Oregon cattle that have wintered around Tule lake in California, just south of the Oregon boundary, were moved back into Oregon by their owners following a 24-hour notice of State Veterinarian Lytle of the closing down of an ironclad embargo against all California stock coming into Oregon, as a precaution against the hoof and mouth disease.

Fire of undetermined origin wiped out the Bly hotel at Bly and patrons of the two-story frame structure were forced to leap from upper windows to save their lives, despite the efforts of a volunteer bucket brigade. Two residences adjoining the hotel were likewise destroyed. The Bly hotel was an old landmark in the Sprague river country east of Klamath Falls. The loss is estimated at \$10,000, with no insurance.

Portland has become the greatest flour milling center of the Pacific northwest. For the period beginning September 1 and ending March 31, Portland manufactured 1,569,287 barrels of flour compared with 1,334,797 barrels manufactured by Tacoma mills and 1,092,820 barrels as the output of

The McKenzie highway, all the way from Eugene to a point 10 miles west of the summit of the Cascades, with the exception of one short stretch, is now in good condition, according to Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest.

With a membership of about 30 growers, the Elkhorn Mountain Head Lettuce association was organized at Haines. Growers present pledged 107 acres of lettuce for the fall market. The association will market its produce independent of distributing companies.

J. W. Mayo of the First National bank, Stayton, was elected president of the Marion County Bankers' association at a meeting in Salem. Other officers elected were Charles Reynolds of Silverton, vice-president, and Keith Powell of Woodburn, secretary and treasurer.

The Eugene chamber of commerce has voted unanimously to endorse the measure to be placed on the ballot at the May election to levy a two-mill tax in Lane county to raise money to meet the county's share of the cost of the state highway bridge across the Willamette river at Harrisburg.

Governor Pierce appointed Rev. E. J. Magruder, Rev. J. W. Anderson, Mrs. Louise Thomas, Mrs. Beatrice Cannady and Edgar E. Wilgan, all of Portland, to represent the state of Oregon at the negro national educational congress to be held in Philadelphia June 16 to 21. Delegates to the congress will pay their own expenses.

because members of the state irrigation securities commission considered present construction costs excessive, the application of the Teal irrigation district for certification of bonds by the state in the amount of \$1,600,000 was rejected at a meeting of that body. Approximately \$900,000 of bonds was voted for development of this district but only \$200,000 has been expended. The Teal district is in Umatilla county and embraces approximately 16,500 acres of land. The commission also deferred certification of bonds in the amount of \$100,000 issued by the Slide irrigation district in Malheur county.

Attorney-General VanWinkle has prepared the ballot title for the proposed measure being initiated by the Oregon Parent-Teacher association, Inc., removing the property qualifications from voters at school elections involving bond issues or the creation of an indebtedness. The purpose of the proposed measure as interpreted by the attorney-general, is "to authorize any citizen of this state, male or female, who is 21 years of age and has resided in the school district 30 days immediately preceding a meeting or election of such district, to vote at such meeting or election without being a taxpayer in such district, or the head of a family having children of school age, which are now required for voting on other questions than the election of school officers."

**Another Halsey-Brownsville Stage**  
Three Trips Each Way to be Made Each day

Brownsville has lost her daily train. For years the Southern Pacific has been trying to make the income from that train balance the outgo, and Brownsville business men, believing the train gave the town a degree of prestige, in addition to actual business convenience, have endeavored to reduce auto competition and otherwise secure a paying railroad patronage, but in vain.  
High wages high cost of supplies and the convenience of having freight taken from or delivered at the door by auto, have driven railroad companies from many short hauls, and in many instances the companies are giving their own auto service instead of running trains.  
A stage has been put on which makes two trips daily between Halsey and Brownsville railroad stations, as follows:  
Leave Brownsville 11 a. m. and 4 p. m., arriving at Halsey 11:25 a. m. and 4:25 p. m.  
Leave Halsey 12:20 and 4:30 p. m., arriving at Brownsville at 12:45 and 4:55.  
Clark Smith, whose certain failure was predicted when he took the Halsey-Sweet Home mail contract as low as he did, is still on the job and seems to enjoy it. He leaves Halsey before 7 in the morning for Brownsville, Crawfordville, Holley and Sweet Home, getting back here about 2. Mr. Clark carries passengers and much freight, and his freight charges have been lower than those of any other carrier over the route.  
The Southern Pacific has also replaced train services with auto stages on the Salem, Dallas, Falls City and Black Rock branch, 25 miles, the Whiteson and Willamina branch, 20 miles, and the Woodburn, Mount Angel and Silverton branch, 10 miles.

**Cash Prizes in Albany College Campaign**  
Through the instrumentality of the Woman's Albany college league, ten prizes, ranging from \$100 cash or a scholarship in Albany college to a number of \$5 cash prizes will be awarded for the ten best essays on Albany student self-help college, located at Albany, Ore., and for which a campaign to raise \$600,000 is now in process throughout the state. Prizes are \$100, \$75, \$50, \$25, \$20, \$10 and four of \$5 each. Any high school student in Oregon is eligible to enter. State headquarters are in the Multnomah hotel, Portland, with J. Henry Lang in charge as director.

**NEW MODERN BUILDINGS FOR ALBANY COLLEGE**  
Rapid Progress Being Made Through-out the State in Campaign to Raise Funds for Expansion Purposes.  
Albany student self-help college, located at Albany, Ore., is to have at least three modern new buildings in which to house its many departments of education, when the campaign now on throughout the state is finished and \$600,000 is raised for expansion purposes. Rapid progress is being made in organization work, according to J. Henry Lang, director, at headquarters in the Multnomah hotel, Portland.  
At Albany college, every student entered must earn all or part of their way by some of the various methods of work employed, it being the policy of the school thus to inculcate habits of the students carrying their own load, the college lending them a helping hand while doing it. It is believed by the faculty and trustees that this better fits a student for life work, hence it is made obligatory.  
Friends of Christian education are being enlisted in the campaign and the response to the call for service has been splendid. Because of the excellent record of the college and the splendid field of opportunity in the northwest, it is believed that a like response will be forthcoming when funds are asked for to put the school on a thoroughly standardized basis as to buildings and productive endowment. Albany college already has \$212,000 productive endowment, but to enlarge its scope and to provide more self-help facilities, it is necessary to have the additional \$600,000, \$100,000 of which has already been subscribed in Albany and vicinity.
