stock raising pursuits.
"Many of the boys specialize in the raising of potatoes. Some go in for raising barley, wheat, corn and rye. The girls usually go in for millinery, fruit canning, dressmaking, cooking and poultry raising. The mem-bers of the club are alloted space at the state fair and their exhibits for the past two years have been exceptionally creditable, the article states."

In the writer's first newspaper days, when a subscriber came in and stopped the paper, he almost considered it a personal affront, but as he grew older in the business, and gathered experience, he learned that stopping the paper is a subscriber's prerogative, and that the best intentions in the world couldn't keep some folks from exercising this prerogative.

There is one type of man who stops his paper and makes the editor believe there really is a hell. This is the sort of man who has read the paper month after month, and year after year, and then when the publisher asks for a little cash to apply on account, the subscriber resents the "dun" as he calls it and verbally castigates the editor and tells him he never subscribed for the paper in the first place, and in the second place it isn't worth a tinker's dam, and in the third place he didn't get it more than every other week, and in the fourth place he just guesses the government says that any newspaper sent to a subscriber after nis time is out cannot be collected for, so just stop the old

There is another type of subscriber whom most editors of country weeklies know altho they fail to honor the type. Grow Supplemental Feed

in Hogging Down Crops When corn is to be hogged down it is always advisable to grow some supplemental food along with the corn. Soy beans and velvet beans are good crops for this purpose. In the case of corn and soy beans the hogs will balance their ration fairly well, but in the case of velvet beans, the hogs may eat the corn first and leave the heans alone to be grazed later. In this case some of the corn may be gathered and fed to the hogs later. If the hogs are given free access to n mineral mixture, feeding value will be added to these crops. It is possible to arrange forage crops so that hogs may be turned on the fields for a period of time and turned out later ready for the market without having beer hand-fed a single day during the
