The California Oregon Power company has applied to the federal power commission for a preliminary permit for an installation on Clearwater river, a tributary of the North Ump qua river, and Nowich creek, a trib utary of Clearwater river, 51 miles northeast of Roseburg, Douglas county. It is proposed to construct a dam about three miles above the mouth of the Clearwater, creating a storage reservoir extending about six miles upstream, to furnish storage and power in connection with the company's other developments on the North Umpqua.

## Will Investigate Collins Trapping

Cave City, Ky .- Circumstances surrounding the trapping of Floyd Collins in Sand cave, and the efforts of volunteer rescuers to release him will be made the subject of a military court of inquiry, Brigadier-General H. H. Denhardt, in command of guardsmen here, announced.

Three principal theories have developed in the Collins case—that the imprisonment of Collins by a rock slide on his leg is a publicity hoax: that enemies, finding him trapped, caused the walls of the cave to collapse so he could not be rescued alive, or possibly caused the slide which trapped him; and the most generally accepted theory, Collins' own story in the early days of the rescue work, that he really was accidentally trapped after discovering a cavern more beautiful than any yet found in the region.

Five electrical tests conducted with oice amplifiers Monday have con vinced H. T. Carmichael, in charge of the Floyd Collins rescue work at Sand cave, that Collins is still alive after ten days' imprisonment.

Senate Farm Bloc Works on Plan Washington, D. C .- The senate farm bloc began Monday to mould agricultural relief legislation for possible passage in the remaining 20 working days before adjournment. Robert D. Carey, chairman and members of the special committee appointed by President Coolidge to investigate the farmers' plight, were called into consultation with the senate agricultural committee. 

France explaining the Baldwin government's viewpoint on the question of the repayment of France's debt to Great Britain lays down succintly the principles of which Great Britain hopes France will agree to meet her obligations, without going into any details or figures. The idea is advanced that details may be threshed out in conference here, should Premier Herriot or Finance Minister Clementel, or both, come to London for this purpose.

First, that Great Britain declines to agree that France's payments should be dependent upon Germany's full payment of the Dawes plan an-

Second, that with a view to facilitating repayments Great Britain is willing to accept fixed annual payments, irrespective of the Dawes proceeds, with a further annual charge on the French share in those proceeds, and

Third, that Great Britain will devote any surplus beyond requirements for her American indebtedness to diminish the burdens upon Great Britain's allies.

England is willing to scale down he debt and the note is favorably received by the French people.
