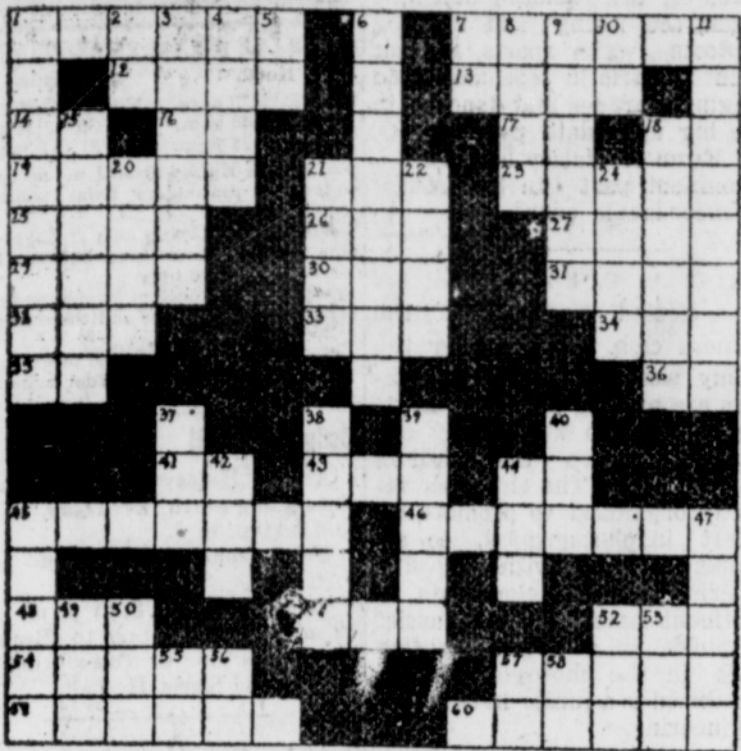


HOW TO SOLVE A CROSS-WORD PUZZLE

1500 LOSE HOMES

Court Orders Lavoye, Wyo., to Quit Oil Field Site.

Cheyenne, Wyo.—The 1500 residents of the town of Lavoye, Wyo., were deprived of their homes by a ruling of Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy here, who ordered that the townsite must be vacated in favor of the Ohio Oil company, which holds a government lease on the land. It is in the Salt Creek oil field.

Business leaders of Lavoye prompt-

ly called a mass meeting at which 100 persons publicly reiterated their stand not to vacate their homes and buildings and announced a continuance of their fight in higher courts.

The townspeople authorized counsel to carry the case to the United States circuit court of appeals at St. Louis.

Borah Pleads for G. O. P. Outlaws

La Follette Followers Assigned to Committees as "Independents."

Washington, D. C.—Over the protests of Senator Borah of Idaho, and other republicans, a new fourth party was created in the senate when the La Follette insurgent bloc was formally driven out of the republican party and assigned to committees as "independents."

This ouster order was approved by the republican caucus and submitted to the senate for confirmation. At the same time the democrats proposed their new committee assignments, in which no punishment was given to Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana, who bolted his party to run on the La Follette third party ticket last November.

Objections to the action of the republican organization in removing four of the republican insurgents from their committee ranks was voiced by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, who took the floor immediately after the report of the majority committee on committees had been presented. This report previously had been approved by a republican conference with some discussion, but with practically no opposition.

Senator Moses, republican of New Hampshire, was elected president pro tem of the senate. Moses was nominated by the administration forces while the democrats proposed Senator Pittman, democrat of Nevada. Moses won by a vote of 50 to 25 on strict party lines. His election later was made by acclamation.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

General John J. Pershing was taken ill at Havana after he arrived from Santiago de Cuba.

Dr. F. J. Stewart, 86, coroner of Pierce county, Wash., died in Tacoma following an apoplectic stroke.

W. B. Curtis, for 16 years postmaster of Marshfield, Or., died, aged 71 years. Curtis was formerly a sea captain.

The late United States senator McCormick left his entire estate of more than \$2,000,000 to his widow, Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick, for her lifetime.

An explosion of kerosene used to start a fire in a heating stove resulted in the death of Mrs. Jethro W. Sheltz and her three small children at Lostine, Or.

Postal employes throughout the country will receive in their pay envelopes March 14 an additional check covering the increased pay voted them in the new postal pay and rate bill. The pay increase was retroactive to January 1.

Seizure of Booze Ships Held Legal.

New York—Vessels landing or attempting to land bootleg liquor in the United States from any point on the high seas are liable to seizure under the tariff act of 1922, Federal Judge E. L. Garvin ruled in effect in deciding in favor of the government in

its forfeiture action against the Dutch auxiliary schooner Zeehoed. The victory gave the government possession of one of the most valuable cargoes ever seized on a rum boat—liquors said to be worth more than \$200,000.

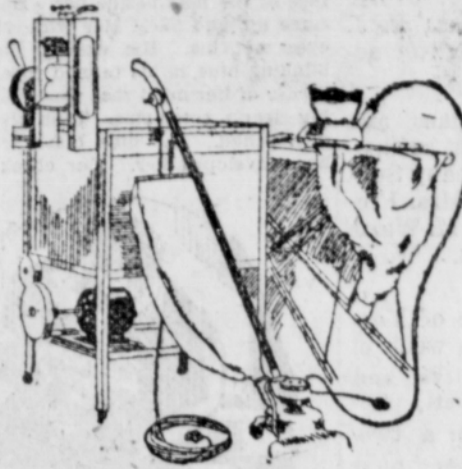

Son Fails to Get Mother's Penalty

Los Angeles.—The dramatic "confession" of 15-year-old Harold "Soggy" Willis that he murdered Dr. Benjamin B. Baldwin had apparently failed to save his mother from a life term in prison.

"The boy is lying like a gentleman," Byron Fitts, chief deputy district attorney, declared. "The case will not be re-opened."

The district attorney's ultimatum virtually means that Mrs. Margaret B. Willis, the lad's mother, must serve a life sentence in San Quentin penitentiary. She was convicted after a lengthy trial in superior court here and appeal for a new trial was denied by the supreme court.

Mrs. Willis expressed her sorrow that her son had "confessed" to a crime for which she would rather pay the penalty.

Harold, according to evidence submitted when Mrs. Willis was granted a seven days' stay of execution, has confessed that he shot Dr. Baldwin when the latter attacked his mother, but that he was sent out to play after the shooting and consequently did not know the doctor was dead until after his mother had packed the body in a trunk, cast it over an embankment north of here and finally had given herself up to the police.

Mayo Says Cancer Will be Controlled.

Philadelphia, Pa.—Dr. Charles H. Mayo, of Rochester, Minn., one of the country's leading surgeons, told the Philadelphia forum in an address that he believed cancer would be "under control" within a few years. By this Dr. Mayo said he did not mean that cancer would be cured nor that it would be preventable, but that it would be more amenable to treatment and that its working would neither be so rapid nor so serious. He based this belief, he said, on the theory that cancer is caused by an organism, perhaps by a germ, and on the Wasserman test through which it is claimed the presence of cancer may be detected.
