
HOW TO SOLVE A CROSS-WORD PUZZLE

When the correct letters are placed in the white space this puzzle will spell words both vertically and horizontally. The first letter is each word is indicated by a number, which refers to the definition listed holes the puzzle. Thus No. 1 under the column heated "horizontal" defines a word which will fill the white spaces up to the first black square to the right, and a number under "vertical" defines a word which will fill the white spaces up to the first black square to the next black one below. No letters go in the black spaces. All words used are dictionary words, except proper names. Abbreviations, along, initials, technical terms and obsolete forms are indicated in the definitions.



Son Fails to Get Mother's Penalty

Los Angeles .- The dramatic "confession" of 15-year-old Harold "Souny" Willis that he murdered Dr. Benjamin B. Baldwin had apparently failed to save his mother from a life term in

"The boy is lying like a gentleman." Buron Fitts, chief deputy district attorney, declared. "The case will not be re-opened.

The district attorney's ultimatum virtually means that Mrs. Margaret B. Willis, the lad's mother, must serve a life sentence in San Quentin penitentlary. She was convicted after a lengthy trial in superior court here and appeal for a new trial was denied by the supreme court.

Mrs. Willis expressed her sorrow that her son had "confessed" to . crime for which she would rather pay the penalty.

Harold, according to evidence aubmitted when Mrs. Willis was granted a seven days' stay of execution, has confessed that he shot Dr. Baldwin when the latter attacked his mother. but that he was sent out to play after the shooting and consequently did not know the doctor was dead until after his mother had packed the body in a trunk, cast it over an embankment north of here and finally had given herself up to the police.

England Concerned About Aircraft

Paris .- Europe made a faltering but definite step toward peace when Messrs. Chamberlain and Herriet came to a practicel understanding which in high political circles is expected to be the basis of a future agreement binding France, England. Belgium and Germant in a mutuat security pact under the anapices of the League of Nations.

Chamberlain told Pramier Herrict _ that England was vitally interested in such a pact, but believed that it should have a much wider acope than a more defensive alliance. It is understood that Chamberlain broached the sub ject of mutual supervision of arme ments, practically intimating that England was willing to guarantee France's Rhine frontier protided France was willing to give strong asaurances in regard to her aviation program, the extent of which has been seriously weerying England.

Chamberlain maintained that Kng. land's refusal to guarantee the froe tiers of Poland was based on the belief that this was a matter for the League of Nationa. Chamberlain's interview with Pre-

mier Herriot was marked by great cordiality on both sides.

Mayo Says Cancer Will be Controlled. Philadelphia, Ps .- Dr. Charles H. Mayo, of Rochestey, Minn., one of the country's leading surgeons, told the Philadelphia forum in an address that he believed cancer would be "under centrol" within a few years. By this Dr. Mayo said he did not mean that cancer would be cured per that it would be preventable, but that the would be more amenable to treatment and that its working would medther be so rapid nor se serious. He based this belief, he said, on the theory that cancer is caused by an organism, perhaps by a germ, and on the Wasserman test through which it is claimed the presence of cancer may be detect-

Borah Pleads for

La Follette Followers Assigned to Committees as "Independents."

Washington, D. C .- Over the protests of Senator Borah of Idaho, and other republicans, a new fourth party was created in the senate when the La Follette insurgent bloc was formally driven out of the republican party and assigned to committees as "independents."

This ouster order was approved by the republican caucus and submitted to the senate for confirmation. At the same time the democrats proposed their new committee assignments, in which no punishment was given to Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana, who bolted his party to run on the La Follette third party ticket last November.

Objection to the action of the republican organization in removing four of the republican insurgents from their committee ranks was voiced by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, who took the floor immediately after the report of the majority committee on committees had been preseated. This report previously had been approved by a republican conference with some discussion, but with

practically no opposition. Senator Moses, republican of New Hampshire, was elected president pro tem of the senate. Moses was nominsted by the administration forces while the democrats proposed Senator Pittman, democrat of Nevada Moses won by a vote of 50 to 26 on strict party lines. His election later was made by acciamation.
