FOOD FOR CHILDREN WHO TRAVEL

Many times, and especially during the summer months, mothers are forced to take their children on trips with them. During these trips, the parent is forced to contend with that ever-present and serious problem of food for the child.

As in almost every other case, the chief source of worry, during these periods, is the milk supply, its source, its purity and its food value. It is not always convenient to get market milk of dependable quality for, in many sections of the country, adequate facilities for its care are not provided. To meet the needs of mothers in these trying situations, science has provided a form of milk, conveniently carried and easily prepared. The cans are in two sizes, the one containing six ounces and the other sixteen.

Evaporated milk is just pure cow's milk with more than half of the water removed. None of its food value is lost; in fact its digestibility is improved. It is easily mixed with water and is, undoubtedly, the most practical form of milk for use as a food for children. Some of the country's leading pediatricians recommend its use, employing the following formula:

From Sixth Week to Third Month.
Milk, evaporated 6 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Bottled water 24 ounces
Seven feedings in twenty-four hours, 1 to 5 ounces at three-hour intervals during the day and four-hour intervals at night.

From Third Month to Fifth Month.
Milk, evaporated 7 1/2 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Bottled water 24 ounces
Six feedings in twenty-four hours, 1 to 6 ounces at three-hour intervals during the day and a feeding at 10 p. m.

From Fifth to Seventh Month.
Milk, evaporated 10 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Bottled water 24 ounces
Five feedings in twenty-four hours, 1 to 7 ounces at four-hour intervals, the last feeding to be given at 10 p. m.

From Seventh to Ninth Month.
Milk, evaporated 11 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Bottled water 24 ounces
7 to 9 ounces at four-hour intervals during the day. Last feeding at ten at night.

From Ninth to Twelfth Month.
Milk, evaporated 12 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Bottled water 24 ounces
1 to 9 ounces at four-hour intervals during day. Last feeding at ten at night.

The same quantity of pure fresh milk may advantageously be substituted for evaporated milk and water. Once opened, sterilized evaporated milk and fresh cooled milk from the cow are equally liable to infection and deterioration.

U. S. PROGRAM DISCUSSED

In Event of Coal Strike Government Will Take Hand.

Swampscott, Mass. — The government will take a hand in the anthracite coal field wage negotiations should an agreement not be reached and a strike be called September 1.

The program which the government will pursue in the event of a strike was discussed at a three-hour conference here by President Coolidge and Secretary Davis. The latter was hoping that an agreement would be reached before the present wage contracts expire, August 31.

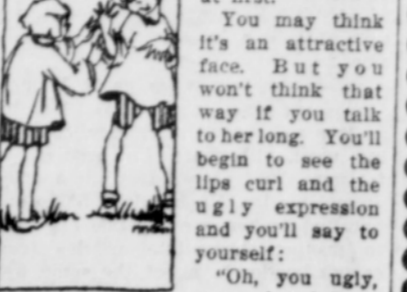
New Postal Rates Fall to Show Gain. Washington, D. C.—The controversy over postal rates was reopened Monday by a joint congressional committee which first heard a postoffice department estimate that the new rates, inaugurated April 15, had fallen far short of producing the additional revenue expected. Postmaster General New told the committee that, for the month of May, the first full month of operation for the new rates, postal revenues were estimated to have in-

creased only \$4151, or 0.001 per cent, over the total that might have been expected under the old rate. The estimate was based on reports from 262 representative offices.

ENGINEER FINDS NEW RAY

Scientist Says Solar Radio-Activity Has Pushing Power.

Minneapolis, Minn.—A Minneapolis engineer, H. J. Smith, declared he had discovered a mysterious new force, "black rays" of the sun, which exert a pushing instead of the pulling power hitherto supposed to be one of the influences keeping the earth in its orbit, and he has so far demonstrated the truth of his claim that Dr. Henry A. Erikson, head of the physics department of the University of Minnesota, has abandoned plans for a vacation and shut himself up in his laboratory to see if the law of Newton must be scrapped or amended.

U. S. and Canada O. K. Four Pacts

Washington, D. C.—Ratifications of four treaties between the United States and Canada were exchanged at the state department. The treaties relate to smuggling, extradition of criminals, boundaries and the level of water in the Lake of the Woods.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Total French casualties so far in the Moroccan war with Abd-El-Krim's Rifians are given as 4418. Of these, 707 were killed, 2775 wounded and 666 missing.

The Belgian government has agreed with the French and British for the early evacuation of Dusseldorf, Duisburg and Ruhrort, simultaneously with the evacuation of other places in the Ruhr.

An air dispatch service between the summer White House at Swampscott, Mass., and Washington has been established by the navy department. Important communications between the president and federal departments will be carried daily by a naval seaplane.

The revaluation bill passed by the reichstag, providing for exchange of German war-time and pre-war loans for new issue equal to 5 per cent of original loans was signed by President Hindenburg. Obligations totaling 70,000,000,000 marks were thus converted into gold debt of 3,500,000,000 marks.

AUSTRALIAN LOAN IS MADE

J. P. Morgan & Co. Buy \$75,000,000 Bond Issue.

New York.—For the first time in its history, the commonwealth of Australia has turned from London to New York for its external financing. J. P. Morgan & Co. announced the purchase of a \$75,000,000 Australian loan, which was offered for public subscription. Simultaneous offering of a £5,000,000 loan was made in London.

Allotment of the major portion of the present financing to the American market resulted from Great Britain's gold resumption policy.
