Chicago.-Babe Ruth, king of swat, will not play in 1926 with the New York Yankees, he told a group of newspaper men here upon his arrival from St. Louis. This statement was amplified with the assertion that Ruth would quit if Miller Huggins was retained as manager.

Ruth told newspaper men that he was under contract to the Yankees for the 1926 season and that if Huggins was retained it would be necessary to trade the Bambino to some other team.
