The barograph was sealed. The last altitude recorded was 2100 feet, indicating the giant dirigible fell from that height.

Storm Kills Twelve Near Wenatchee

Cloudburst Turns Creek Into Raging Torrent Spreading Death and Disaster.

Wenatchee, Wash.—Twelve dead and two missing was the total toll of the cloudburst which destroyed half a dozen buildings at the apple-yard terminal, two miles south of Wenatchee Saturday afternoon. The bodies of the following had been recovered: Mrs. George Cleveland, 50; J. Evans, 75; H. H. Overman, 35; Alex Murdoch, 32; Mrs. C. A. Butts, 48; Ralph Pettit, 22; of Everett, Wash.; Mary Groff, 8; Anice Groff, 6; Florence Groff, 4; Anna Earnst, 2; Mrs. Dominic McDonald and George Groff, aged 14 months.

The missing were: Mrs. James Smythe, Mrs. McDonald's baby.

Wenatchee and vicinity was stricken with the worst disaster that had ever befallen the community. Almost out of a clear sky, without the slightest warning, a cloudburst occurred along the watershed of Squilchuck creek. Every creek and dry gulch leading into the Squilchuck suddenly became a raging torrent and poured down a flood of water which in turn transformed the creek into a stream carrying as much water as the Wenatchee river usually empties into the Columbia at high water.

When this flood struck the apple-yard terminal at South Wenatchee it was estimated to be from 12 to 20 feet deep. The water smashed into half a dozen houses built on the site of the old tourist campground and then struck the Springwater hotel, three stories in height, carrying it across the road a distance of 60 feet into the Terminal hotel.

Huge rocks, dirt, wreckage and all kinds of debris were carried down with the flood, piling up as high as 30 feet along the tracks of the Great Northern terminal.

Mitchell Roils the Higher-ups

San Antonio, Tex.—Bitter charges of "incompetency, criminal negligence and almost treasonable administration of the national defense by the navy and war departments" were hurled at the two departments by Col. William F. Mitchell, air service officer of the eighth corps area, here.

In a lengthy written statement the former assistant chief of the air service blamed this alleged incompetency or the disaster to the Shenandoah and to the P.N.S.-1, naval seaplane which apparently has been lost on an attempted flight to the Hawaiian Islands.

The fiery officer attacked the navy's Pacific fleet maneuvers, the Shenandoah's ill-fated flight and the attempt to make a non-stop flight to Hawaii as merely attempts to get publicity.

He charged the navy with neglect or starting the non-stop flight to Hawaii with "primitive flying machines" and with vessels stationed 200 miles apart to patrol the route—"distances entirely too far apart."

"The whole Pacific fleet should have been employed there instead of joy-riding around the Antipodes," the statement asserted.

The Shenandoah, Mitchell believes, was "about 50 per cent overweight in her structure."

Caldwell, Ohio.—The missing barograph of the Shenandoah, which recorded the craft's wild flight before she plunged to earth, was found by Fred Meyers, a Cambridge bricklayer, near where the control cabin of the ship fell.

The instrument was delivered to Commander J. H. Klein of the court of inquiry, who declared it would enable the court to definitely establish the careening maneuvers of the Shenandoah.

General Dawes On the Warpath



Vice President Dawes has been visiting Oregon towns (including the village of Portland) this week and telling people in red-hot language what he thinks of the bar-nacle-covered rules of the United States senate, which are giving the people barrels of useless gab in exchange for the money spent in prolonged and extra sessions. Dawes is one vice-president who will not be squelched, and his appeal to the voters is likely to enliven coming elections of senators. He has gone on to California.

Centralia, Wash.—Enemies of organized government were assailed by Vice-President Dawes here Sunday in an address over the graves of the men who were shot down from ambush during an Armistice day and patriotic demonstration several years ago. At the conclusion of his remarks the vice-president laid wreaths on the graves.

"This town is honored as the resting place of four members of the American Legion who lost their lives in an attack by the enemies of organized government," declared Mr. Dawes. "There is no better place, I am sure, and no more I can do in their honor than to say here a few words upon government, upon law enforcement and upon the constitution behind which the American Legion is an organized reserve."
