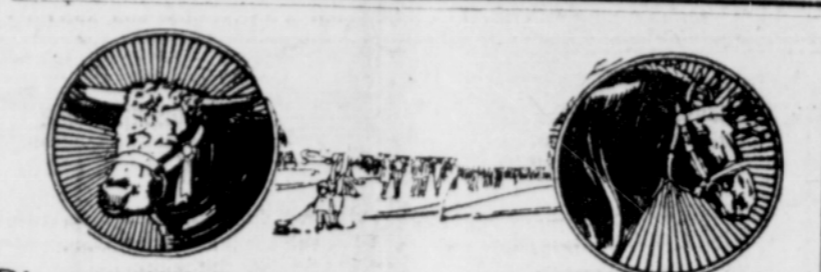

Biggest and Best Linn County Fair
 Clean Attractions Draw the Best... Improved Conditions
 Not an "Agricultural Hoss Trot"

Linn county last week had the best agricultural fair in its history, from the standpoint of those who went there to be entertained, from that of the financial managers and from that of those specially interested in its moral aspect. It was of an uplifting tendency both industrial and mental.

One of the officials writes to this paper: "This has been pronounced the best fair we ever have had. I can state this without throwing any bouquets at myself, as Mr. Gilkey is entitled to all the credit. The exhibits excelled anything previously shown. The attractions were clean, and I think reflected credit upon Linn county."

Farther along in this report will be found a communication from Rev. Robert Parker of the Halsey Methodist church corroborating the foregoing. Less money was appropriated for horse racing than heretofore. The sporting and gambling gentry were not encouraged, and the result confirms a belief that they are not essential to a successful fair. There was no "agricultural hoss trot" this year and the financial result was better.

Western Star grange for some reason failed to make an exhibit, so there were eighteen communities represented, instead of the expected nineteen. The corn exhibit was the best yet and confirms Oregon's claim to be a corn state. Mr. Schunk of Brownsville drew first. Schunk and C. L. Falk Sr., of Halsey came to the Oregon country together and Mr. Falk was prominent with his prize-winning Percheron horses of several generations.

The horticultural display was magnificent, though, there were larger apples in the window of the Koontz store. These were grown by a Halsey man who will not know whether we give his name or not, as he does not take the Enterprise. The grower of a couple of radishes weighing 6 or 7 pounds each in the same boat, so it will be seen that there are two people in Halsey who do not do their duty in supporting the hometown paper.
