News Notes From All Over Oregon, Gleaned by the Western Newspaper Union for Busy People

Portland water rates will be raised 20 per cent December 1. Two new grade school buildings are planned for next year at Eugene. Nearly 300 school teachers of Coos county assembled at Marshfield to attend the annual institute. A poor season was experienced by salmon fishermen on the Siuslaw river, according to reports. The 20th conference of the Independent College Presidents' association of Oregon was held at Albany. A vein nine feet wide and rich in copper ore was struck at the Mother Lode mine, 25 miles northeast of Baker. A new shingle mill to cost in excess of \$15,000 will be added to the plant of the Spalding Logging company at Salem. Fire of an unknown origin destroyed an apple storage house and 4500 boxes of apples belonging to B. M. Durland at La Grande. Two hundred boys from various towns in the Willamette valley attended the annual older boys' conference at McMinnville. Secretaries of the various commercial clubs in western Oregon met in Salem Saturday. Problems of special interest to western Oregon were discussed. The contract was awarded by the Eugene water board for construction of a 3,000,000-gallon reservoir on Skinner's butte to B. C. Seydel company of Portland for \$61,802.83. Merging of the Oregon State Drainage association and the Oregon Irrigation congress probably will be considered at a meeting of the drainage association in Salem December 15. J. Lyman Steed, assistant superintendent of the Pennsylvania state school for the deaf, has been elected superintendent of the Oregon deaf institution to succeed O. L. McIntire. Dancing in the Salem high school in lieu of secret organizations, which were abolished recently by the school authorities, is advocated by Max O. Buren, ex-member of the school board. Luzern Gray, an aged bachelor, was burned to death when he attempted to start a fire with the aid of kerosene in his lonely one-story frame cottage located in a remote suburb of Portland. can buy timber sale area of the Crater national forest, 45,000,000 board feet of timber were sold in that area this year, an increase of 10,000,000 over 1924.

A fire starting in the kitchen of the hotel at Siletz destroyed the hotel and butcher shop owned by Grant King, and the store belonging to Walter Hall, the total loss aggregating \$25,000.

The general merchandise store owned by C. F. Wade at Olex was destroyed by fire, which also took other buildings housing the telephone exchange and postoffice. Loss was estimated at \$40,000.

One hundred and four mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending November 21, manufactured 104,847,909 feet of lumber; sold 108,594,417 feet and shipped 98,248,042 feet.

Fritz Drebert, 50, operator of a shoe repair shop in Portland, was killed when the motorcycle sidecar in which he was riding was hit by an automobile on the highway between Milwaukie and Oregon City.

Ducks recently found dead at Ocean beach, near Astoria, died from eating fermented, or spoiled, wheat, according to a report from the state food and dairy commission chemist received at the game commission offices.

The state board of control, over the protest of Sam A. Kozar, secretary of state, has approved a policy of refusing to return to the state training school boys who escaped and get outside of the state of Oregon.

The Cope Film corporation will locate the northwest studio of its motion picture industry in Eugene, according to W. S. Cope, head of the concern. The construction program calls for an expenditure of \$500,000.

Attempt to prevent arrest of his father for shooting ducks from a motorboat caused Owen Smith of Langlois to be bound over to the grand jury of Curry county under bail of \$500

for interfering with and assaulting H. M. Averill, deputy game warden. Averill, it is charged, was clubbed over the head by Smith.

Voters of the city of Prineville approved a 20-mill tax to pay for the locomotive purchased during the summer and to care for indebtedness incurred in the operation and maintenance of the City of Prineville railway.

The partly completed roof of a big tabernacle which is being built at Bend for E. Arthur Lewis and Edmund T. Campbell, evangelists, crashed down while 32 people were working on the main floor, but one sprained wrist was the only injury.

M. N. Ford, secretary of the Ohio state board of pharmacy and president of the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy, has announced the appointment of Frank S. Ward of Portland, as a member of the association's committee on publications.

F. M. Brown of Portland, chief deputy state game warden is in Klamath Falls in an effort to collect delinquent fines assessed in local courts for game violations over a period of several years. The delinquent payments are said to total nearly \$1500.

A decision to invite the officers of the national organization of the humane society to attend the 17th annual Pendleton Round-up September 15-18, 1926, was made by unanimous consent at the annual meeting of stockholders of the association at Pendleton.

Klamath Falls is to have a mounted policeman. This is the decision of the city council, which has authorized the purchase of a horse and saddle. The mounted "cop" will devote most of his time to driving stray horses and cattle off cemetery lots and the lawns of private homes.


The Southern Pacific company has placed itself on record against the increase in butter, eggs and cheese freight rates ordered by the interstate commerce commission between Portland and California points, and has objected.

Germany Signs up for World Peace **President Hindenburg Immediately Signs Measure Legalizing Pacts.**

Berlin.—President Von Hindenburg placed the seal of his approval of the Locarno treaties by affixing his signature to the bill which legalizes the security pact and arbitration treaties and Germany's entry into the league of nations. By giving executive approval to the law in less than 24 hours after it was ratified by the reichstag, the president administered a rebuke to its reactionary opponents, who still hoped he would refrain from approving it on constitutional grounds. His action definitely smothered the last embers of the fiery opposition kindled by the German nationalists, and it is also received in parliamentary circles as a compliment to Chancellor Luther and Dr. Stresemann, the foreign minister. By a vote of 291 to 174 the reichstag adopted the bill legalizing the security pact drawn up at Locarno and the supplementary treaties with France, Belgium, Poland and Czechoslovakia. Approval also was given to the arrangement whereby Germany is to apply for membership in the league. Parliamentary sanction came after a stubborn partisan battle lasting six weeks. The outcome was never really in doubt but the chancellor and foreign secretary were confronted with unrelenting opposition by reactionaries.

The Russ Would Grab Far Cathay Washington, D. C. — Soviet Russia has begun its long threatened—and feared—campaign to bore openly into Chinese affairs, according to confidential advices reaching official sources here. The crumbling of Marshal Chang Tso-lin's Manchurian empire, which leaves General Feng, Yu-hsiang in virtual control of all of Central China, and the quiet infiltration of thousands of Russian troops disguised as civilians, are the main developments in what is regarded by diplomats as a gigantic soviet plot to communize China. General Feng is openly backed by the soviets, who for many months have been pouring arms and ammunition into Kalgan, his stronghold, east of Peking. Russia's activities in China are said to be based on a desire to smash the British empire in Asia by spreading soviet propaganda in India, which is regarded as a fertile field.

MINERS ACCEPT PROPOSAL Pinchot Plan Adopted "As Basis of Settlement" of Strike. Harrisburg, Pa.—Representatives of the United Mine Workers accepted "as a basis of settlement" the plan submitted to them by Governor Pinchot ending the present suspension of hard coal mining. They agreed to meet the operators' representatives in joint conference at any time to negotiate an agreement covering the proposals submitted by Mr. Pinchot and announced that promptly after such an agreement on the part of the operators they would arrange to resume mining at the earliest possible date. The action of the miners was taken at a meeting here of union officials and members of the tri-district scale committee.

German Navy Hero Joins U. S. Army. New York, N. Y.—A gunner in the German fleet during the historic battle of Jutland, Wilhelm Giesecke, was enlisted for service in the ranks of his one-time enemy—the United States army. It was announced Sunday that he had been accepted as a private in the sixteenth infantry, quartered on Governor's island. He was personally decorated by the Kaiser for bravery in action while a member of a German submarine crew.

7500 Mayors in Italy Removed. Rome.—About 7500 Italian mayors have been suddenly legislated out of office and the control of fascism has been extended to municipal governments by the passage of the new municipal reform bill by the chamber of deputies.
