Mrs. M. M. Ward had her daughter, Mrs. W. J. Moore, and husband, from Brownsville as Sunday guests.

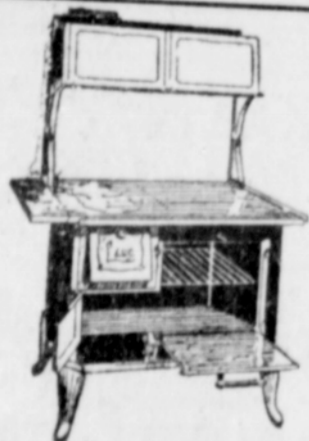
