**News Notes From All Over Oregon**

Gleaned by the Western Newspaper Union for Busy People

There were seven deaths in Marion county due to traffic accidents in 1925.

Huckleberries in the Coast mountains around Gardiner are still ripe.

The school population of the Medford district has increased 138 over last year's total of 2600.

Building expenditures in Salem for the year 1925 exceeded all previous records. Permits for 1925 aggregated \$1,794,935.

Eugene's fire loss in 1925 was light, according to a report submitted by W. E. Nusbaum, fire chief. The loss is estimated at \$16,216.

Bank clearings in Eugene broke a record in 1925, the total being \$27,543,443.05. This is an increase of more than \$5,000,000 over the clearings in 1924.

L. L. Dougan of Portland has been employed to prepare plans for a ten-story office building to be erected at Salem this year by the First National bank.

Five counties in the state have reported 100 per cent collections of delinquent income tax through warrants sent out recently by the state tax commission.

The body of Bartholomew Isenhoot, 92, was found hanging from the rafters of a building near the home of John Coy, eight miles from Bandon, apparently a suicide.

The Kruse & Bards shipyard of North Bend has obtained the contract for construction of a cruiser for the Alaska fish commission and will start work probably in January.

Salem's population increased approximately 7 per cent during 1925, according to estimates based upon new water taps, telephone installations and patrons of the local post office.

Postal receipts in Portland for December were placed at \$342,469.71 by John M. Jones, postmaster. This is an increase of 15 per cent or \$45,450.84 over the receipts for December, 1924.

John B. Coffey, prominent in state politics for many years, clerk of Multnomah county and a member of the state legislature for several sessions, died at St. Vincent's hospital in Portland.

ton sawmill in the Lake creek valley, over the summit of the Coast mountains to Junction City, has been finished.

The public service commission has ordered the Skamania Light & Power company to repair leaks in its lines which have been interfering with radio reception in the vicinity of Cascade Locks.

There was turned over to the state treasurer by the clerk of the state land board during December an aggregate of \$108,743.35, according to a statement prepared by the land board officials.

Strata containing coal have been found in the lower Crooked river country. It was announced at Bend by a contractor working on the highway bridge which is to span the Crooked river gorge.

A gain of 52 in the school population in Union county is shown for the past year by the recently completed census. In 1924 the school population for Union county was 5333 compared with 5385 this year.

Steel for the highway bridge which is to span the Crooked river canyon on the route of The Dalles-California highway is now arriving at Bend and it is expected that the construction of the bridge will start in the next few days.

Medford has completed the most successful business year in its history, approximately \$5,000,000 having been received in exchange for products shipped to eastern markets. Fruit and lumber revenues formed the major portion.

Eight miles of pavement, 250 miles of rock surfacing, 300 miles of grading to state standards and 30 bridges of more than 30-foot span, comprised the important improvements completed by the state highway department during the year 1925.

Ninety-six of the 183 dairies that supply Portland with milk scored between 95 and 100, Dr. D. W. Mack, chief of the city milk division, announced as the result of the semi-

annual summary of the condition of the city's milk supply.

Recovery of Harry Aiken, about 35, a rancher of the Prospect district, near Medford, is doubtful, following an accidental shooting when a .38-caliber pistol fell from his hip pocket and was discharged as it struck the running board of his automobile.

Whether prohibition has proved a success in the state of Oregon is the question that has been referred to Governor Pierce by members of the house of parliament of Australia. A letter requesting the information was received at the executive department at Salem.

The valuation of the properties of the Eastern Oregon Light & Power company at Baker was \$2,186,000 as of June 30, 1925, according to a report filed in the offices of the public service commission at Salem. The company operates extensively in eastern Oregon.

That the holiday season has curtailed lumber activities is shown by the weekly report that 99 mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending December 26, manufactured 55,797,466 feet of lumber; sold 69,590,487 feet and shipped 74,544,970 feet.

The personal support of Major-General Taylor, chief of army engineers, was assured for the proposed deepening and widening of the Columbia river channel from Portland to the sea in the course of a conference in Washington, D. C., between General Taylor and Senator McNary.

Charles Harlon McClane, eight-pound boy, born at Salem Friday morning to Mr. and Mrs. Harlon McClane, has made claim to a complete wardrobe offered by Salem merchants in conjunction with the Capital Journal for the first baby born in Marion and Polk counties in the year 1925.

## Leaning Towards The World's Peace

Washington, D. C.—President Coolidge requested congress to appropriate \$50,000 to cover the expense of participation by the United States in the league of nations preliminary disarmament discussions.

"Participation in the work of the preparatory commission," the president said in a special message, "involves no commitment with respect to attendance upon any future conference or conference on reduction in limitation of armaments, and the attitude of this government in that regard cannot be defined in advance of the calling of such meetings."

He added that "whether the conditions and circumstances will prove such as to make it desirable for the United States to attend any conference or conference which may eventually take place as a result of the labors of the preparatory commission or otherwise is a question which need not now be considered."

"It is my judgment," he said, "that so far as this preliminary inquiry is concerned we ought to give our aid and co-operation to the fullest extent consistent with the policies which we have adopted."

A state income tax from which 50 per cent of the derived revenue shall be used for education was favored by the Oregon State Teachers' association in session in Portland, and a committee will confer with the grant and other state-wide organizations which foster tax revision to draft a bill to be placed on the ballot at the November election.

The state supreme court in a brief filed at Salem was requested to affirm the decision of the circuit court for Marion county in the proceedings started by the public service commission to compel the major railroads operating in the state to reduce their rates on hay, grains, and various other farm products from 5 to 25 per cent. The brief was prepared by W. P. Ellis, attorney for the commission. The litigation is the result of a proceeding before the public service commission several months ago wherein an order was entered establishing uniform scales of rates to apply on the lines of all the major carriers in the state.

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The big airship was wrecked by the storm which encompassed her, said the report; whether prior minor damage to the hull structure caused by excessive pressure in the helium gas cells was a determining factor in the final breakup, the court was "unable definitely to determine."

Excusing the ship's personnel from responsibility for the wreck, the court declared that during the period of danger "the conduct of all officers and men was deserving of the highest praise." Consequently it recommended that no further proceedings in connection with the wreck be prosecuted.

Geneva.—That arbitration continues to advance steadily is shown by a league of nations communique issued recently explaining that 248 treaties, conventions or other international agreements were registered with the league secretariat during 1925, making the total so registered 1043.

In the 1925 list are treaties of friendship concluded by Turkey with Austria, Denmark, Sweden and Czechoslovakia; Persia and Afghanistan; treaties of conciliation by Switzerland with Brazil, Italy, Austria, Hungary and Sweden; an arbitration convention between Latvia, Estonia, Finland and Poland.

Richmond, Va.—Mrs. E. Lee Trinkle, wife of the governor of Virginia, suffered serious burns when she tried to rescue her small son, E. Lee Trinkle Jr., from the third floor of the burning executive mansion. Both jumped to safety.

## Army Veterans Not Grasping

Washington, D. C.—Four-fifths of the 3,500,000 army world war veterans entitled to the bonus have submitted their applications and virtually all those eligible have been forwarded to the veterans' bureau for the issuance of certificates, Major General Robert C. Davis, adjutant general, said in his annual report on the administration of the law.

Nearly 43,000 claims, General Davis reported, are in the hands of veterans for essential correction, and 39,000 applications were disallowed.

The war department, he revealed, has been "current" with its bonus work for the entire year 1925. About 700,000 applications, it is estimated, are still to be expected from veterans of their dependents.

War department calculations show that \$1,100,000,000 in principal was "earned" by the veterans under the terms of adjusted compensation act, adding insurance calculations, the total amount involved approached \$4,000,000,000.
