Approximately 30,000,000 feet of pine timber in Klamath county will be sold by the state land board at an auction to be held in Salem, January 20.

Debt Settlement Approved by House

\$600,000,000 Is Involved in Agreements Now Up to the Senate.

Washington, D. C. - The war debt greements with Belgium, Rumania, Latvia, Esthonia and Czecho-Slovakia, nvolving approximately \$600,000,000, were approved by the house.

In adopting resolutions to authorize scceptance of terms recommended by the American debt commission, the touse disposed of the last of the settlenents negotiated during the summer. As sent to the senate, all of the igreements provide for a funding of he respective obligations over a 62rear period.

Including the Italian debt, the Unied States will receive approximately 13.000.000.000 from the six war loans. Of the 19 war loans to foreign naions, settlements with Great Britain, Finland, Hungary, Lithuania, Poland and Nicaragua have been ratified by ongress, while the action by the touse brings half a dozen more loans the last step in their congressional ourney.

Of the seven other loans, Austria has been granted a 20-year moratorum, while France, Greece, Liberia and fugo-Slavia have yet to agree finally on their respective settlements.
