One Death Per 1000 Autos in a Year Is Record of U.S.



ONE out of a thousand is the relationship between the annual automobile fatalities and the number of motor vehicles in this country, according the Stewart-Warner Safety Council for the prevention of automot e accidents, which has undertaken a strenuous campaign of automobile safety and accident prevention

And for every fatality there are at least 28 accidents serious enough to get on record. This does not take into consideration minor sprains and bruises or people suffering from nervous shock as the result of being in an automobile

To appreciate what a vast army of killed and injured is annually conscripted by the reckless motorist and careless pedestrian, a comparison may be made with American casualties in the great war. Over a third as many people are killed annually by the automobile as there were American soldiers day. killed on the field of battle during the entire war, while the number injured each year is nearly three times as great as the number of our boys who were wounded throughout the war.

WILL PRESS TAX MEASURE

Senator Smoot Predicts Final Vote by Saturday Night.

Washington, D. C .- The tax reduc tion fight in the senate, centering on proposed repeal of the inheritance tax and discontinuance of the publicity of income tax payments will reach a showdown this week.

Expressing confidence that the senate would approve the compromise between republican and democratic regulars, as embodied in the finance committee's report on the bill and including repeal of these two provisions, Chairman Smoot of the committee pre dicted a final vote would be reached by Saturday night.

If action is not obtained by Saturday night, Senator Smoot said he would press next week to speed up the work. Under this program, leaders expect to assure final enactment of the bill by March 15, when first income tax installments are due.
