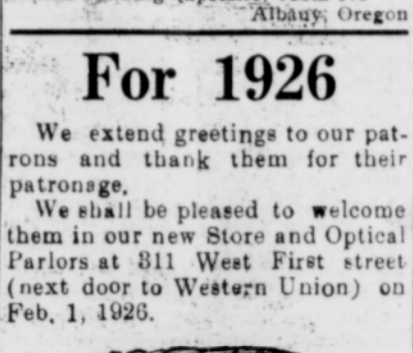

News Notes From All Over Oregon

Gleaned by the Western Newspaper Union for Busy People

Tillamook will have free delivery of mail beginning May 1.
Hop contracts are beginning to be made at Salem for the 1926 crop.
Fire starting from an overheated stove destroyed the Oakridge hotel at Oakridge.
Plans are being drawn for construction of a \$20,000 new school house in the Pine Grove district of Hood River.
February 1 marked the starting date of lambing operations among many big sheep outfits that produce early lambs.
A series of one-day farmers' institutes or extension schools has been arranged by O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agent.
Whether teachers employed in the Salem schools shall receive salary increases probably will be decided at the polls at the May election.
Fourteen rural telephone lines running out of Woodburn have been transferred by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company to an incorporated company.
Reports from the mountains east of Albany give the information that snowfall is deficient by about four or five feet this year, as compared with normal years.
Thomas K. Campbell, incumbent, has filed his candidacy for the republican nomination for the office of public service commissioner from the state at large.
The Pacific Newsprint Mills, with headquarters in Portland, has been incorporated by Joseph H. Rowan, V. A. Johnson and T. B. Handley. The capital stock is \$100,000.
Work has been started on clearing for grading of the 6.88-mile stretch of Redwood highway between Kerby and Selma, by McNutt Bros. of Eugene. A force of 60 men is clearing the right of way.
The voters of Salem at the election next May will be asked to vote a special tax levy of \$5000 annually for a period of three years to finance the activities of the Salem zoning commission.
The Yamhill County Game Protective association met Tuesday night at McMinnville for the purpose of discussing the advisability of closing coast streams to commercial salmon fishing.
Cullison and associates of Portland were successful bidders for the contract of cruising 100,000 acres of timber land in Coos county for \$25,000. The concern has until February 1, 1927, to complete the work. The cruise will start within the next two weeks.
A huge tusk, thought to be of some pre-historic animal, was found by workmen engaged in digging a sewer in Salem. The tusk measured seven feet

in length and approximately nine inches in diameter at its thickest point.
The rainfall in Pendleton during 1925 was slightly more than the normal of 14 inches, according to figures compiled by Major Lee Moorhouse, official weather recorder. The precipitation during the year was 14.15 inches.
The state land board sold to Frank Boutin of Portland approximately 30,000,000 feet of yellow pine timber in Klamath county for a consideration of \$162,752. Money derived from the sale of the timber will go into the irrevocable trust fund.
Definite plans for enlarging the plant of the Oregon Pulp & Paper company at Salem were made at a meeting of the board of directors. Controlling interest in the mill is now owned by Fred W. Leadbetter of Portland.
An military training camps for Oregon citizen soldiers will be held within the borders of Oregon this year for the first time since the war, according to Brigadier-General George A. White, commander of the Oregon national guard, who has returned from Washington, D. C., where he conferred with war department officials.
Location of Fort Williams, established on Sauvie's Island about May 1, 1835, by Nathaniel Wyoth as the first American foothold in this state, will be shown on future maps of this district issued by the United States geological survey, according to word received.
The large Booth-Kelly Lumber mill at Wendling and the camps above closed Saturday for two weeks. The mill then will resume operations and the Springfield mill will close for two weeks. It is expected that they will alternate in this way until the market is better.
The Lincoln county grand jury in session at Toledo, took no action in the alleged deportation of Japanese laborers from the Pacific Spruce sawmill at Toledo, last July. The matter was presented to the grand jury by District Attorney Conrad at the special request of Governor Pierce.

Because of the growing importance of the potato crop in Klamath county, a potato show will be staged at Klamath Falls next October, according to announcement by the chamber of commerce. The potato crop last year yielded \$250,000 and estimates are made that this will be doubled this fall.
The public service commission has authorized reductions in rates on sawlogs shipped from Hubert and Cochran to the log rollways at Menefee and Oswego, on the lines of the Southern Pacific company. The reductions amount to 27 cents and 32½ cents on 1000 feet from Hubert and Cochran, respectively.
Salem and Canby probably will become within a short time the most prominent bulb-growing sections in the United States, according to Jan de Graaf of Holland, who is spending a few days there investigating conditions. Mr. De Graaf is part owner of one of the largest and oldest bulb producing corporations in Holland.
A deficiency appropriation for rivers and harbors which will make immediately available the sum of \$286,000 for deepening the channel at Tillamook harbor will probably be added to the first deficiency bill when it reaches the senate shortly, Chairman Francis E. Warren of the senate appropriations committee has notified Senator McNary.
The suit brought in the federal court in Portland to test the constitutionality of the state gasoline tax law will be appealed to the United States supreme court for final determination, according to announcement made at the attorney-general's office in Salem. Judge Wolverton of the federal court held that the gasoline tax law is constitutional.
The state lime board, at a meeting in Salem, considered the opening up and development of four new lime deposits. The lime would be used in the manufacture of fertilizer. One of the deposits is located eight miles north of Silverton in Marion county, another near Dallas and the third on Marble mountain in southern Oregon. Another deposit is near Gold Hill, not far from the state lime plant.

aid as primary and secondary education, main highways or agricultural experiment stations, Secretary of Interior Work declared in a letter to Senator McNary of Oregon, in which the cabinet member defended the section of the pending interior department supply bill requiring a pledge of state assistance from Oregon before construction on the Vale, Baker or Owyhee projects is authorized.

Directors of the Portland chamber of commerce have authorized the foreign trade committee of the chamber to make a survey to determine what specifications and clearances for a proposed bridge spanning the Columbia river at Longview and Rainier would give assurance that if the bridge is built it will not obstruct navigation of the river. The chamber is opposed to present specifications calling for 155-foot vertical clearance at low water.
The mill and timber holdings of the Coos Range Lumber company at Mabel, 20 miles northeast of Eugene, will be sold at auction by the sheriff February 26 and 27, to satisfy a judgment for more than \$253,000 held by the Continental & Commercial Trust & Savings bank of Chicago and a second mortgage of approximately \$313,500 held by the Dollar Portland Lumber company. The sale will include about 7000 acres of timber land and 8½ miles of logging railroad, and practically all of the town of Mabel.
Trucks operating under private contract with no fixed terminals cause the same degree of damage to the highways as do trucks operating under the classification of common carriers and should be compelled to pay their just proportion of money required for the maintenance of the traffic arteries according to a brief filed in the state supreme court by the public service commission. The brief was prepared by W. P. Ellis, attorney for the public service commission in the suit brought by the Purple Garage company and other truck operators to restrain the commission from enforcing the state automotive transportation act against these carriers.

Money Talks ; or Talk Costs Money
\$50,000 Voted to Pay Cost of Delegation to Meet at Geneva.
Washington, D. C.—Plans for American participation in the parliamentary disarmament discussion at Geneva crystallized into a definite project when the senate adopted without debate the resolution providing \$50,000 to pay the expenses of an American delegation.
The house already had approved it, and the next step will be communication to the council of the league of nations of an official acceptance of the invitation to take part and announcement by President Coolidge of the personnel of the delegation.
Minister Hugh Gibson, at Berne, Switzerland, will head the American delegation, and Rear Admiral Hilary P. Jones and Brigadier General H. A. Smith, who have been in collaboration with state department officials in preparation of instructions, now are slated for appointment as chief technical advisers. They will have the assistance of other officers of both the war and navy departments, and will be authorized to draft military or naval attaches now abroad for services.

Farm Prices Reported Lower.
Washington, D. C.—With the exception of hay and potatoes, the farm prices of all crops were lower on January 15 than on the same date last year, the agriculture department announced.

Coast Guard Men Go to Prison.
Atlantic City, N. J. — Eight coast guards convicted by a courtmartial of charges ranging from disobedience to smuggling were sentenced to one year each in the naval prison at Portsmouth, N. H.

Federal Income Tax Collections Gain
1925 Revenue From Income Levy Exceeds 1924; Other Sources Lower.

Washington, D. C.—Despite generally lower levels of tax rate in effect during 1925 the federal government received a greater volume of taxes than it did in 1924. Official figures for the two years, made public by the bureau of internal revenue, showed total receipts of \$2,694,257,246 for 1925, compared with \$2,688,045,620 for 1924, or an increase last year of \$6,211,625.
The revenues from sources other than the income tax failed to go forward under the stimulus of reduced taxation. The income taxes, however, yielded \$1,825,704,135 last year, a gain of \$24,599,724 over 1924. Miscellaneous receipts dropped from \$886,941,208 in 1924 to \$868,553,100 in 1925.
Total receipts from Oregon taxpayers dropped from \$9,559,927 in 1924 to \$7,790,999 in 1925, but the decline was more notable in the instance of income taxes alone, which dropped \$7,915,120 in 1924 to \$6,448,030 in 1925, or almost \$1,500,000.
Receipts of miscellaneous taxes from Oregon fell off some \$300,000 from \$1,643,907 in 1924 to \$1,342,969 in 1925.
Receipts from the state of Washington, including Alaska, by the 1925 preliminary figures were \$14,492,578, as compared with \$18,558,892 the year before. Income tax receipts dropped from \$15,336,347 to \$12,168,725, and receipts from miscellaneous taxes from \$3,222,634 to \$2,322,853.

American Machines Preferred to Gems
Moscow.—Soviet Russia is ready to turn her crown jewels into American tractors and machinery. Negotiations are in progress for the sale of the vast collection of gems to American and other foreign jewelers, but it is realized that private buyers can take only a negligible portion of these treasures because of their enormous volume. The government, therefore, is prepared to exchange the remainder for American agricultural machinery, locomotives and other products Russia urgently needs.
