McCamant Puts His Foot in It

Washington, D. C.—The senate judiciary committee again is considering the president's nomination of Wallace McCamant as federal judge in Oregon and among other phases of it McCamant's assertion that Theodore Roosevelt "was not a good American."

Judge McCamant, now serving under a recess appointment, made the statement near the close of his testimony before the committee in answer to charges by Senator Johnson, republican, of California, who is opposing his confirmation. Roosevelt, he said, was not a good American because as the Bull Moose candidate for president in 1912, he had advocated "recall of judicial decisions" in violation of a fundamental principle of the government.

Senator Johnson brought out the assertion while questioning Judge McCamant concerning his failure as a delegate to the 1920 Chicago convention to vote for the senator as winner of the Oregon primaries for the presidential nomination.

LUMBERMEN TO ADVERTISE

Pacific Northwest Operators to Spend \$1,500,000 in Campaign.

Seattle, Wash.—Four hundred lumber manufacturers, logging operators and timber owners in conference here, favored launching a \$1,500,000 advertising campaign for Pacific northwest woods.

Funds for the campaign are to be raised by assessing 5 cents for each 1000 feet of lumber a mill ships. Logging operators are to pay a similar sum for each 1000 feet of timber sold, and mills that do their own logging will pay both sums. All companies entering the campaign are to sign a three-year contract.

When One Has No Fresh Milk

PROPER FOOD FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

The age during which children are attending school may aptly be called "The Dangerous Age." It is the period of rapid growth and every care should be taken to insure the child of a normal and healthy body. The idea of eating only fit and wholesome foods should be early impressed on the younger members of every family in order to protect them against later ill health and its accompanying unhappiness. If the utmost care is not taken in the diet that is used by children, cases of food poisoning, indigestion and kindred ailments may result.

And milk, being the chief item in the diets of most children, should be carefully guarded. It is, because of its nature, prone to infection if exposed to germs and may soon become unfit for use. Wherever there is the slightest reason for doubt as to its purity and food value, steps should be taken to insure the sterility and the fitness of milk intended for consumption by children. Many mothers have adopted the excellent practice of using milk that is absolutely pure and sterile and free from any germs or bacteria. The most satisfactory, as well as the safest milk used in preparing food for the growing child is evaporated milk.

It is sterile, and therefore safe. It is more digestible than market milk. Its uniformity, convenience and cost are qualities that recommend it.

The following dishes are well suited to the needs of the growing child; they are easily digested and very nourishing:

Caramel Custard.
1 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1 cup water
1 cup sugar (caramelized)
1/2 tsp. vanilla
Scald the diluted milk. Caramelize the sugar and add to milk to dissolve. Beat eggs slightly, add sugar, salt, and flavoring and combine with scalded milk. Pour into custard cups and set in a pan of hot water and cook in a moderate oven. When done, a knife blade run in the center will come out clean.

Fish Chowder.
1 pint raw fish cut in 1-inch dice
1 small potato, sliced
2 onions chopped fine
1/2 pound fat salt pork, sliced
3 cups boiling water
1 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1 cup water
1 cup cracker
Fry out the salt pork. When brown, remove pieces of pork and put fish, potatoes, and onions in kettle. Cover with boiling water. Simmer until potatoes are tender. Add the milk and cook 5 minutes longer. Season with salt and pepper. Just before serving add the crackers.

U. S. NOW READY TO JOIN

Entry Now Subject to Approval of 49 Nations.

Washington, D. C.—President Coolidge will put the United States into the world court without delay. Secretary of State Kellogg was instructed by him to approach the 49 member nations at once with diplomatic feelers to ascertain whether they will permit the United States to join with the reservations of adherence by the senate.

The refusal of a single state to accept those conditions would prevent the signature of the United States to the protocol and statute now deposited in the headquarters of the league of nations at Geneva.

Leaders of the pro-court forces expressed confidence that the present members of the court would find acceptable the reservations and declarations of policy in the resolution of adherence.

Adherence of the United States to the world court with reservations was approved by the senate, 76 to 17.

The vote brought to an end one of the bitterest fights the senate has had since the memorable struggle over the league of nations.

Mellon's Monopoly Attacked by Walsh

Washington, D. C.—Senate investigation of the Aluminum company of America, in which Secretary Mellon is a large stockholder, is recommended in a report submitted to the judiciary committee by Senator Walsh, democrat, of Montana.

The proposal is made the senator says, because of "doubts aroused as to the vigor and good faith of the department of justice," in the conduct of its inquiry to establish whether the Aluminum company has violated a federal court consent decree entered against it in 1912.

Besides recommending what would be a third government investigation of the Mellon company within four years, Senator Walsh asks that the senate direct the federal trade commission to turn over to it all the evidence furnished by the Aluminum concern and which the commission withheld from the justice department on the grounds that it is "confidential."

Efforts to Ditch N. P. Train Fails.
Kelso, Wash. — Northern Pacific passenger train No. 405, northbound, narrowly escaped wrecking Sunday morning about 11 o'clock when it struck a tie and several rocks, which had been piled onto the track in a rock cut on the Lewis place, six miles north of Castle Rock. The attempt to wreck the train is believed to have been the work of a maniac or of some person who had a fancied grievance against the railway company.

Wage Inquiry Is Asked in Senate.
Washington, D. C.—Gerald P. Nye, the youthful senator from North Dakota who was seated a few weeks ago after a stiff fight, crashed into the limelight by introducing a resolution for a sweeping investigation into wages and working conditions in the cotton, woolen, worsted, steel and aluminum industries.
