**Bishop's Boost for Booze is Bogus**

New York.—The newly announced policy of the church temperance society of the Episcopal church, favoring modification of the Volstead act and legalizing of light wines and beer, has brought a violent storm of opposition and defense throughout the United States.

Prohibition leaders, Episcopalian organizations and individual clergymen have challenged the statement of the Rev. Dr. James Empringham, national secretary of the society, who in announcing the new policy, asserted that the Volstead act had failed.

The society, the challengers maintain, has no authority to speak for the Episcopal church, is relatively unimportant and is in error in its reversal of policy. Even members of the organization itself are taken aback by the announcement. A meeting of the board of directors will be called soon to consider the situation.

Defenders of Dr. Empringham, including several church dignitaries, assert that his conclusions after a year's investigation are correct. Dr. Empringham stands by his guns and reiterates that a poll of 20,000 members of the society showed a preponderance in favor of modification of the law.

**To Equalize School Fund Benefits**

Olympia, Wash.—Resolutions favoring a county purchasing agent for all school districts in the county and endorsing a plan for a special fund for equalization of school apportionments to afford relief to the poorer districts, to be raised by a 3-10 mill district property tax, were adopted by the convention of state school directors at closing sessions here. The legislative committee was instructed to present such measures to the next legislature.

Endorsement of the county plan of uniform text books was given, as opposed to state uniformity. Resolutions adopted also favored legislation for certain maintenance allowances for the state superintendent, to exempt from "for hire" car licenses private bus drivers transporting pupils and teachers only, and favoring removal of \$60 annual salary limit for clerks of third class districts.

Officers were reelected as follows: C. W. Cahill, Spokane, president; Mrs. Irma Hortsman, Port Angeles, and O. M. Beatty, Walla Walla, vice presidents; executive committee, Z. H. Shay, Pacific county; C. E. Ferguson, Thurston county, and J. G. Green, Skagit county.

**Male and Female Rouen Ducks Are Much Unlike**

The Rouen duck is the most beautiful of all ducks, and the dark Muscovy next handsomest. The latter are of blue body, green back, white tail, white band about the neck, deep red face and yellow legs, and both sexes are alike. But the Rouen, male and female, are distinctly unlike. The duck is a bright red and brown, feathers penciled evenly with black, red bill, and two transverse stripes of white and black on the wings. The drake has a green head and bill, a white neck band, brown breast, blue underbody, green back, white tail, bars of white, black and brown on under tip of wings, with reddish yellow feet.

**Care and Feed for Calf**

An important thing is to keep the buckets or other utensils from which the calf is fed scrupulously clean at all times. The calf bucket should be washed daily. If it is allowed to get sour, scours are almost sure to follow. After weaning, grain feeding should be continued. Three or four pounds of a good grain mixture will keep it in fine condition until it is a year old and a little more grain should be fed the second year.

**Celery and Cheese Casserole.**  
1 cup cheese 1 tbsp. butter  
2 cups chopped celery 1 cup cooked spaghetti  
1/2 cup evaporated milk 1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs  
1/2 cup water 1/2 tsp. salt  
2 tbsp. flour

She makes white sauce of milk, water, butter, flour, and salt, and mixes it with all ingredients except crumbs. She then places it in an oiled baking dish and covers with crumbs, baking in a moderate oven until brown.

**Chicken a la King.**  
1 cup cold chicken, diced 1/2 cup evaporated milk  
1 tsp. butter 1/4 lb. mushrooms  
1 tsp. flour 1 cup chicken broth  
1/2 green pepper, shredded 1 egg yolk  
1/2 pimento, shredded Salt and pepper

Cook the peppers (also mushrooms, if they are used) in the butter for 15 minutes, keeping them covered while cooking slowly. Add the flour and seasonings, also the milk and broth. Stir to a smooth sauce. Put chicken in sauce to heat, and just before serving, stir in beaten egg yolk. Cook in double boiler to prevent curdling.

**BRIEF GENERAL NEWS**

Senate investigation of the recently formed Ward Food Products corporation, was proposed in a resolution introduced by Senator La Follette, republican, Wisconsin.

By an overwhelming majority the senate refused to consider a proposal that President Coolidge be requested to call in the miners and operators in an effort to end the anthracite coal strike.

The supreme national council, formed by coalition of democratic and nationalist parties to centralize efforts looking to Philippine independence, recommended Washington's birthday, February 22, as national day of prayer for independence.

The British government, by official expressions of appreciation and awards of gallantry and medals, paid tribute to souvenir of American officers and seamen of the United States liner President Roosevelt, who at risk of their own lives rescued the crew of the British freighter, Antiope, lying helpless and disabled in the grasp of the storm-lashed Atlantic.

The Canadian government, aroused by charges made in the house of commons of smuggling operations involving millions of dollars across the United States border, will at once name a committee to investigate alleged lawless operations. Smuggling of silk, jewelry, cotton goods, liquors and other articles is carried on with conviction of the Canadian customs officials is charged.

**Congress Drowning in Flood of Bills**

Washington, D. C.—The difficulties congress encounters in trying to keep its head above the flood of proposals by its 531 members is strikingly illustrated by the cold statistics of what has been accomplished in the two months of the present session.

Since opening day on December 7 exactly 11,737 bills have been introduced and just three were passed through all the stages necessary before they become the law of the land.

The only piece of legislation of importance to reach President Coolidge is the joint resolution appropriating \$50,000 to defray the expenses of American participation in the preliminary disarmament conference at Geneva.

The senate has spent most of its time considering the resolution of adherence of the United States to the world court, which was adopted last week.

The house has been going ahead faster, but with new proposals coming in every day congress cannot hope to consider a third of them.

A great bulk will find a final resting place in the waste paper basket after this congress expires.

**U. S. TO FIGHT FOOD TRUST**

Suit Begun at Baltimore to Prevent Huge Consolidation.  
Washington, D. C.—The federal courts were asked by the government Monday to prevent formation of "A huge combination in the baking industry" by the Ward interests and others.

In an anti-trust suit filed in Baltimore, the government named the General Baking, Continental Baking and United Bakeries interests as linked with the Ward companies in the enterprise. An investigation was requested.

Action of the government follows several months of investigation by the department of justice.

"These investigations developed facts which, in the opinion of the department, evidence a clear intention on the part of those responsible for the mergers eventually to bring together the several merged companies under control of one gigantic corporation," Attorney General Sargent said.

**Secretary Davis is Seeing Things**

Washington, D. C.—With one air service upheaval barely subsided, through the resignation of Colonel William Mitchell, another and perhaps more far-reaching row started when Secretary of War Davis ordered an investigation of alleged "lobbying" activities of officers of the army air service.

The inquiry has been sanctioned by President Coolidge, whose ire has been aroused over the opposition of air service officers to the administration's air program as embodied in the Morrow board report and their efforts in behalf of the Patrick plan for a unified air service.

Davis has ordered Major General Eli Helmick, inspector general of the army, to conduct one phase of the investigation and, oddly enough, has called on Major General Mason M. Patrick to conduct another phase of it.

Patrick is chief of army air service and has persistently differed with his superiors and with the general staff on vital questions of air service policy.
