Former Halsey Man is Good at Figures

Fred W. Hayes, a relative of D. J. and other Halsey Hayeses, is a mail handler for the North Pacific Terminal company of Portland. Recently the Brotherhood Co-operative National bank offered \$10, \$7, \$5 and on down for the best ten computations of the present-day value of a savings account started with \$62 at a date during Queen Elizabeth's reign at 4 per interest, compounded semi-annually.
 Mr. Hayes won the first prize, the judges pronouncing him correct within the one-thousandth part of a cent. His answer was \$85,686,870.55 and additional figures to the fifteenth decimal.
 The winner of the second prize was \$7.09 cents below Mr. Hayes and the one in third place said: "\$85,685,998.88."

Smallpox was dropped from the list of diseases reported by the state board of health last week and the number of cases of influenza jumped to 272, with 34 of pneumonia. There were 48 of scarlet fever and 40 of whooping cough.
