Halsey Happenings

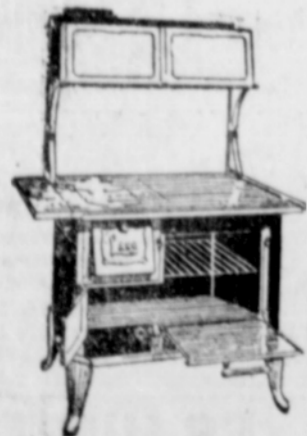

Yellow Corn for Chicks

Can Be Used Extensively

Heat and vitamine A. two factors required in chick nutrition, are present in yellow corn to a greater degree than in any of the grains commonly used. Hence yellow corn can be used extensively in chick feeding with every assurance of success. Oats, barley, wheat, white corn do not contain vitamine A in appreciable quantities, so are not now considered in the same class as yellow corn when used as chick feeds. A ration made up of 80 pounds of yellow corn meal, 20 pounds wheat middlings, 5 pounds raw bone meal, 5 pounds pearl grit, and 1 pound salt, mixed as a mash and fed dry from hopper or pan, will give excellent results providing liberal quantities of skim milk and clean fresh water are also supplied. Direct sunlight will complete it.

The farmer cannot control the market price of his products, but he can in a very large degree control the cost of production and one of the best means for doing this is to maintain his land in a high state of cultivation.
