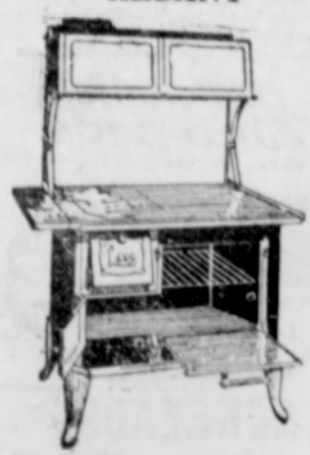

\$25,000,000 for Dry Enforcement

Washington, D. C.—The federal government will spend approximately \$25,000,000 the present fiscal year for prohibition enforcement. Assistant Secretary Andrews told the house ways and means committee.

The enforcement department is losing "good men" through inability to offer salaries that will attract experts, he said, urging passage of a bill to create separate customs and prohibition bureaus.

Andrews told the house ways and means committee he endorsed the Green bill, creating separate bureaus of prohibition and customs in the treasury, as the chief weapon to remedy the present situation of loosely connected enforcement agencies.

"Centralized authority," said Andrews, "will eliminate much of the red tape which has hampered enforcement in the past."

Houghton Slated for Kellogg's Post Washington, D. C.—Announcement of the immediate return from London of American Ambassador Houghton revived reports here that he is being groomed to succeed Frank B. Kellogg as secretary of state. The primary object of Houghton's visit is to confer with President Coolidge on important recent European developments, including postponement of the League of Nations' preliminary arms conference.

Luther Burbank 77 Years Old Santa Rosa, Cal.—The 77th birthday of Luther Burbank, world-famed naturalist and Santa Rosa's foremost citizen, celebrated Sunday, when citizens from all sections of the "Valley of the Moon" gathered here to do him honor. The scientist's birthday is Arbor day in California, made so by legislative act 11 years ago, and a portion of the observance included tree planting in keeping with the sentiment of the occasion.

Wants Wings of Board Clipped

Washington, D. C.—Asserting the shipping board with divided responsibility had defied the president, Secretary Hoover urged that it be stripped of all powers except its judicial and regulatory functions and that the entire government merchant fleet be administered by the Fleet corporation.

The secretary, who testified before the house committee, said such a procedure would be in accordance with the original conception of creating the board. Differences between the executive and the board, he said, was "one reason why we have made no more progress with our merchant marine."

The committee, which took up the Bacon bill to carry out the principle of Secretary Hoover's proposal regarding the shipping board, recently approved a bill providing for co-ordination of all navigation functions now supervised by the department.

"We will never have a real or satisfactory merchant marine until it is owned and maintained by private enterprise," the secretary said, but he advocated government aid "to keep the flag flying on critical routes" until this could be achieved.

PERSHING RECOVERS HEALTH

Gives Up Teeth in Fight on Toxic Poisoning.

Washington, D. C.—Having surrendered all his teeth and himself unreservedly to the care of physicians, General John J. Pershing is back to normal health and is feeling better now than he has for years.

The general gave up his teeth in the fight against toxic poisoning and his blood pressure which ranged around 185 points when he returned to Washington has dropped to between 140 and 145 during the two weeks of treatment. The quiet of his hospital quarters in contrast to the continuous turmoil attaching to his duties in South America also has done much to improve Pershing's condition.
