

SCHOOL HEADS URGE **CHANGES IN LAWS**

as regards existing school laws of the state and nation were adopted after discussion here by the 39 county school superintendents of the state, after being in session for three days. Among one of the changes urged

was one resolution favoring the enactment of a federal law providing for a department of education with a secretary of education to be included in the president's cabinet.

Another resolution adopted would eliminate the present statute prohibiting graduates from the state normal schools from teaching grade school classes, and being restricted to service in high schools. It was pointed out that the graduates from similar schools in other states were unrestrained in being permitted to come to the Washington grade schools: Among a score of resolutions of var-

icus kinds, the delegates adopted one recommending that senate bill No. 166 of the recent special session be enacted so as to provide for a countrywide uniform adoption of textbooks, and day at G. J. Rike's and C. L. that a fund for this purpose be raised Falk's Sr. by state taxation.


