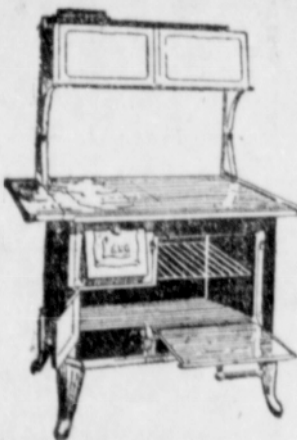

HOUSE TABLES RAIL BILL

Plan Would Have Helped Oregon Trunk Railway Project

Washington, D. C.—A proposed amendment to the interstate commerce act which would have permitted the Oregon Trunk railway to build an extension southward into Klamath Falls from Bend without procuring any certificate from the interstate commerce commission has been blocked for this session of congress in the house committee on interstate and foreign commerce, where it was indefinitely tabled after the senate had passed it without a dissenting vote.

The house committee voted to postpone any action on the amendment for the remainder of this session after a number of railroads had made strenuous objection against any change in the existing law.
